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10 Years of Savings Using The TFSA (Tax Free Savings Account)

Happy 10-year anniversary to the tax-free savings account. That's right, the TFSA, once a secondary savings account where people would mostly store short-term cash, hit double digits in January and it's sure grown up over the years.

People have realized that virtually anything that can be held in an RRSP can be held in a TFSA. That's stocks, bonds, mutual funds, more long-term investments – you can put long-term retirement assets into it.

As the years have gone by, the TFSA's annual dollar limit has grown. In 2013 it rose to \$5,500 and, as of January 1, 2019, it's \$6,000. (It did jump to \$10,000 in 2015, but went back to \$5,500 the following year.) The current total contribution room for those were at least 18 years old in 2009, Canadian residents and who have never used a TFSA is \$63,500. That's a lot of room to work with.

With 10 years having passed since the introduction of the TFSA, we wanted to know if Canadians are thinking about these accounts differently than they once did. We spoke with Jonathan Braun, Manager of Tax and Estate planning at IG Wealth Management.

HOW DO PEOPLE VIEW THE TFSA TODAY?

When it first came out most people saw it as another savings account – a literal bank savings account – because it had savings account in the title. So, they were a little confused and thought

it was limited to just savings. Over the years, people have realized that virtually anything that can be held in an RRSP can be held in a TFSA. That's stocks, bonds, mutual funds, more long-term investments – you can put long-term retirement assets into it.

NOW THAT TOTAL CONTRIBUTION ROOM HAS INCREASED TO MORE THAN \$63,000, HAS THE PERCEPTION OF THE TFSA AS A SHORT-TERM PLACE FOR CASH CHANGED?

It has, or at the very least, people now have more flexibility. When the contribution limit was only \$5,000, you weren't saving a lot in tax. Now that you have \$63,000 of room, the tax savings on investment earnings start to make a difference. As well, because it's a viable option for mutual funds and long-term investing, you can make it a part of your retirement plan. And with a \$6,000 limit, which will start creeping up to a larger figure over the next few years, it's becoming more relevant to a person's retirement.

HOW WOULD HIGH NET-WORTH INDIVIDUALS USE A TFSA?

Not much has changed there. Most high net-worth individuals would probably max out their RRSP first and then max out their TFSA. They're probably already maxing it out every year – it wouldn't take much for them to do that. But anyone who isn't taking advantage of a TFSA, should.

NOW, 10 YEARS ON, WHAT DO YOU LIKE ABOUT THE TFSA?

It's simple and it's great for people who max out their RRSP and want another place where their money can grow tax-free. Personally, I use it for long-term retirement planning. So, I put in the maximum each year. When I pull it out in retirement, I won't have to pay tax on any withdrawals, so it can supplement my other sources of retirement income. It's just another tool people can use to save, and save as cheaply as possible.

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MLA REPORT

One of the great things about being an MLA is getting to meet and eventually serve your constituents.

Over the past three weeks I have had so many opportunities to celebrate special events with constituents.

The Calmar parade and the gigantic flea market down main street has become one of the things I most enjoy attending. Many of you have seen the little red 1965 Corvair my wife drives in all of the parades across the constituency. So it was a lot of fun to discover in the antique store in Calmar an old set of 1965 Alberta license plates that are even red and white that can now adorn my parade car.

There are not many businesses in this constituency that can claim to have been in business for 90 years. So it was an amazing night spent celebrating the 90th anniversary of the Thorsby Hotel and Bar. There was great music, lots of people and it was so interesting to see some of the old pictures of the hotel over the years, especially the picture of the Thorsby Men's baseball team taken in the hotel.

Just the other day I went down to where the oil spill south of Drayton Valley occurred. No one wants to see an oil spill, especially one that affects a creek that feeds the North Saskatchewan River but I was so proud of the clean-up effort I saw going on. The scope of the effort taken to clean up what in comparison to some of the spills we have read about is a relatively small spill was impressive. The booms, skimmers and clean-up crews, the vac trucks and oversight by the AER all of these people and agencies were working together and getting the job done. It made me proud to be part of the

best, most environmentally responsible oil industry anywhere in the world. Good job guys!

I also had the pleasure this past week of attending the media event for EAVOR an Alberta energy company drilling a deep well geo-thermal pilot project near Rocky Mountain House. Several hundred attendees saw two rigs two and a half kilometers apart drill two wells 2.5 kilometres deep and then drill laterally and connect the two bore holes together to create a continuous loop that will collect the heat of the earth. I don't believe that the expertise and technology exists anywhere else in the world to do this and should the technology prove successful then the first commercial geo-thermal electrical project is slated to begin sometime in the next year in Drayton Valley.

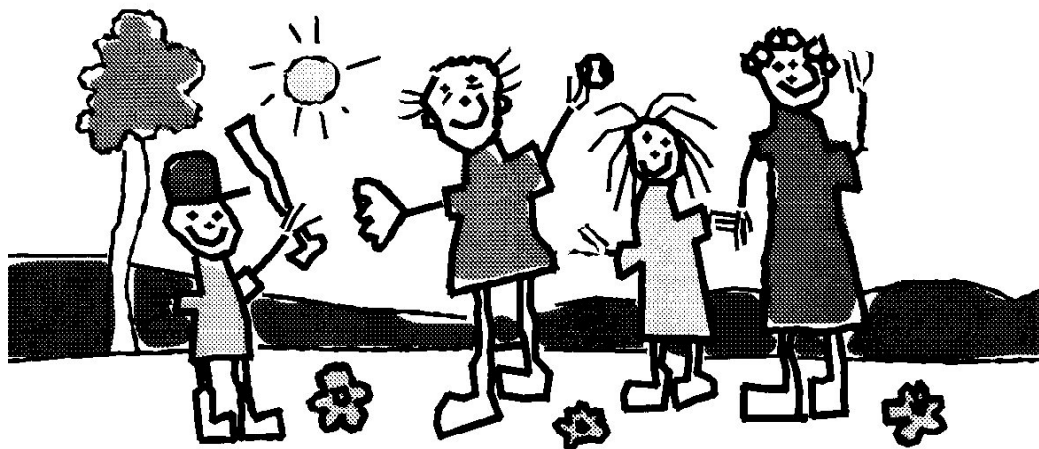

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Straight Out of Thorsby

JOAN YEE (ELSON)
Part 1 of 2

My parents arrived in Thorsby separately and single. My mom, Pearl Christensen, was a recent graduate from the University of Alberta Nursing Program. She had 3 job offers at that time: one with the Victorian Order of Nurses, the second with AADAC as a nurse councillor, and finally one with the Leduc Strathcona Health Unit as a public health nurse in Thorsby. Not knowing anyone, she made her way to Thorsby and in true Pearl fashion started meeting everyone and making friends. My dad arrived later in 1968. He had previously taught school in Whitecourt, but was offered a job with the County of Leduc at Thorsby High School as a physical education teacher. Somehow the two met and were married within a year (the details on this are scant, but perhaps it would make a good Thorsby Target investigative reporting story?). They were married on December 26, 1969 – Boxing Day. My sister and I always assumed this was because our dad was a big pugilist fan, but apparently it had something to do with not wanting to take time off work. I still prefer to believe the former. So, while our family roots were not deep in the Thorsby area, the community was welcoming, and it became the place we all called “Home”.

In many ways, Thorsby was a great place to grow up. As a young person, I was able to wan-

der and explore. As a town kid, my friends and I would ride our bikes from one side of town to the other and also venture down the country roads. Looking back, it really allowed us to connect with nature and develop a love of the outdoors. However, the wandering did evolve into there being times when I would just leave the house and not tell anyone that I was leaving or where I was going, including when a babysitter was over. I realize now what a luxury this was to be enjoyed in a small community. The wandering continues and we have instilled a love of travel and exploring in our own children – often when we visit a new city we will explore by foot to get the true local flavour of a place.

Related to the exploring, being active was always a part of my life in Thorsby. I have early memories of skating on the outdoor rink located to the east of the public works/fire department, which was down the (gravel) street from the house where we lived. By the time I was 10 years old, the Recreation Centre was built, complete with an indoor ice arena. A few years later my mom signed me up for figure skating. Quite frankly, I wasn't all that keen to figure skate, but I was willing to try. It didn't take me long to realize how much I enjoyed skating. With the strong support of my parents, my time at the rink (in Thorsby, Warburg, and Leduc) became a very central part to my life as a teenager. Thanks Mom!

The schooling offered us in Thorsby was thorough and focused on the basics – and in doing so provided a launching point for students to further their (formal & informal) education in any desired direction (as shown in these “Straight Out of Thorsby” articles). The schools in Thorsby were small and I am sure the funding matched the population. As a result, the teachers worked hard to provide us with meaningful experiences by volunteering their own time to do so– field trips, camping trips, sports teams and other extra-curricular (yearbook, students union activities). This includes my dad who had coached basketball/baseball/football teams (in-

cluding provincial championship teams in 1972) and organized student trips in the 1970s to Italy. I recall him coaching a teen boys baseball team in the early 1980s where I would often attend the practices and games. As a family, we watched Edmonton Trappers baseball and more recently, watched MLB in various cities such as Toronto, Seattle, Kansas City and Chicago. This past summer my daughter Emma was selected to sing the national anthem at 7 Edmonton Prospects baseball games, with our whole family including my parents, my sister Kathy and her husband, often in attendance. While my own 'mosquito' baseball career was not fantastic, baseball has become my "go to" spectator sport – Thanks Dad!

After high school, I left to attend school in Edmonton. I don't believe anything can really prepare a student for the transition from high school to an educational institution as large as the University of Alberta. I graduated in 1995 with a degree in geography – focusing on an area of study that examines the relationship between humans and the environment. I became interested in how communities were built and what influences the building of them. I decided to take this topic one step further in a more applied sense and look at how the built and natural environments impact our health – this area of study is called environmental public health. In 1998 I graduated with a Bachelor of Applied Science from Ryerson University in Toronto, moved to Sarnia, Ontario and worked for Lambton County Health Unit and became a certified Public Health Inspector (CPHI(C)). I eventually made my way back to Edmonton, tried out a few other jobs, before accepting a position with Health Canada's First Nations and Inuit Health Branch. I had the privilege of working with First Nations communities for 15 years, focusing mainly on aspects of environmental public health protection. During that time, I visited many communities in all corners of the province but spent most of my time in Treaty 6 (which Thorsby is a part of) and Treaty 7 (southern Alberta). I developed an interest in how data can be leveraged (based

on how data are collected, stored, analyzed) to support evidence-based decisions. I was part of a team that designed and deployed a software application that integrated drinking water sample test results (based on the Canadian Drinking Water Guidelines) and geographic locators which provided First Nations and their partners with a means to use this information to make decisions related to a range of topics from public health protection to capital planning. Ten years later, the system is still in use. In 2015, I joined the public health team at Alberta Health Services mainly working on initiatives that address the impact of community design (including neighbourhood design, transportation networks, accessibility of healthy foods, and the natural environment) on public health (the occurrence of chronic disease like diabetes, heart disease, cancers, etc.) More recently, I was given an opportunity to lead a provincial team that provides support for environmental public health data management services and education programming for the 5 Zones of Alberta Health Services. As well somehow I managed to do a M.Sc. in Public Health Sciences, graduating in 2007 – I don't quite remember how it all happened as it's a bit of a blur, but I do remember handing in my thesis on a Thursday and then giving birth to our second daughter the following day.

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Gear up your child for school the right way, with a comprehensive eye exam

It's that time of year again: summer is winding down, and it's time to get ready for back to school. Most parents' routines involve shopping for new clothing and school supplies so their children are prepared to succeed. What many parents tend to overlook is their child's most important learning tool: their eyes.

"Early comprehensive eye exams are critical to helping children succeed in life" says local optometrist Dr. Sara Starko. "A child's eyes are constantly used in the classroom and at play."

One in four children has a vision-related learning difficulty. A child with a visual problem won't know how the world looks and will assume that what they are seeing is normal. What's more, children with uncorrected vision or eye health problems face many barriers in life: academic, social and athletic.

It can be hard for a child to catch up after struggling and falling behind through the basics of reading, writing, and math. Countless children in Canada are told every day that they have a learning disability when in reality the problem was their vision. A vision screening is not enough.

"A child who sees 20/20 can still have a vision problem," says Dr. Starko. Visual acuity is one aspect of our visual system, but the skills needed for successful reading and learning are much more complex. Vision-related learning problems can cause children to reverse words when writing or copying, confuse the same word in the same sentence, skip lines while reading or read the same line twice. "Optometrists don't just check sight. They check how well the eyes work together and how sight is processed."

Vision problems aren't always obvious (especially if it's a problem with only one eye), and the development of a growing child's eyes doesn't stabilize until age 20. Alberta Health Care covers a comprehensive eye exam every year for children 18 and under. Dr. Starko recommends that babies have their first eye exam between six and nine months.

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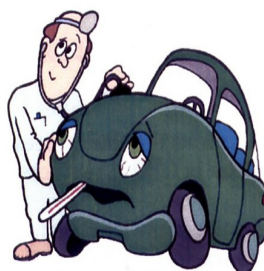
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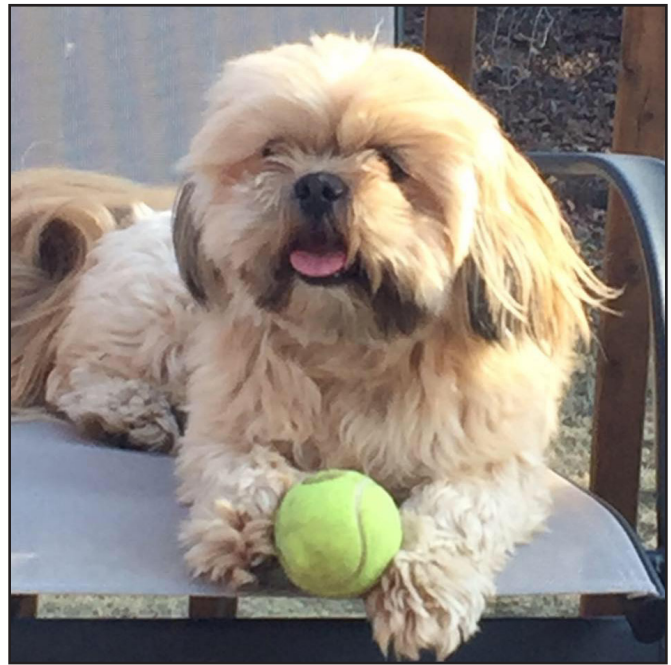


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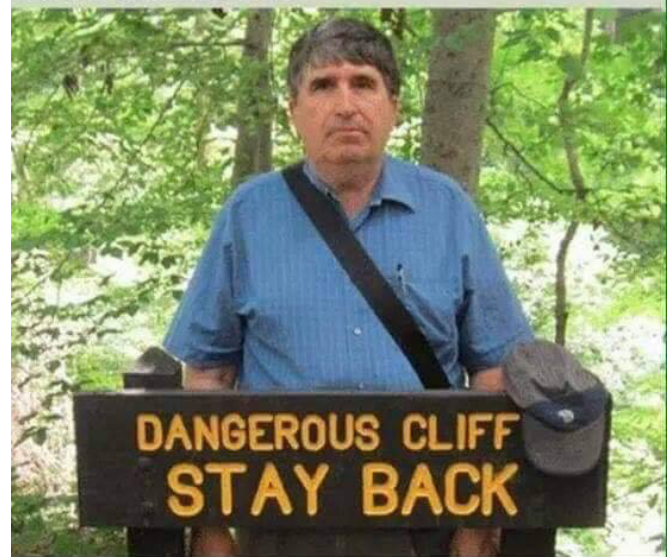
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
