

Open Letter to Residents From Thorsby Mayor and Council

We were disappointed to see the comments put forward last weekend on Facebook. We want to remind everyone that we will screen shot any defamatory, discriminative, fact less based rumors, perpetuated as truth, and we will decide if in any case, we need a legal opinion for damages.

I can assure everyone NO ONE has been fired and we do not have plans to fire anyone! Our Recreation Centre is, and will remain, the heart of this community! SO, for the second time, our Recreation Centre IS NOT CLOSING PER-MANENTLY!

We are bound to follow Alberta Health Services guidelines. The county cost shares 60% of all cost. The ice is still in and no decisions will be made without consultation with the County and the Minor Hockey Association.

Laying off our Recreation Centre staff for a second time is very difficult. This very difficult decision was based on the financial burden of continuing to pay wages for staff in a building that we cannot open.

It is truly sad that these are the same employees who went above and beyond to get the facility open and enforce COVID-19 rules. It is so unfair! We would like to thank our employees for doing such an amazing job during these unprecedented times.

Five recreation employees were laid off due to COVID-19. Some were offered other roles, and we respect their decision not to take the job offered to

work at the municipal office.

The reference to Family Community Support Services (FCSS), to us, was the most disturbing.

During COVID-19, most services are provided by phone, email or digitally. I can assure FCSS clients that services that always were available, are still in place. There is no need to create a panic.

Slandering and defaming the new Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) is counter productive, and those doing it will be held accountable. We can not go back to the **disruptive effect of having FIVE CAOs over a SIX-year period.** Out of the 32 applicants for the CAO position the Council felt she was the most qualified for the position.

In our comparative research, we were the only town of our size, in the province, that had the unnecessary cost both a CAO and a Chief Financial Officer (CFO) and restructuring this position is part of Council's ongoing commitment to ensure we find efficiencies and cost savings for residents without jeopardizing services. Going down to one employee, from the previous two, will save taxpayers money.

The new CAO is a Certified Professional Accountant (CPA) registered with Canada, Alberta, and British Columbia Association. The new CAO started her services as the CFO on September 27, 2020, in order for us, (Town of Thorsby), to apply for the "Municipal Sustainability Plan" grant that was due September 30, 2020. The grant application was successful, and the Alberta Government released the funds during October of 2020. The funds received are available for infrastructure for the community's benefit, starting in Spring of 2021.

The CAO needs to manage, which includes staff. Anyone who runs a business, knows managing staff can be difficult. Employees do not manage, managers manage, and it's all employee's responsibility to achieve the common objectives laid out by Administration, through the direction of Council.

Being here less than a month in the new role as the CAO, and having to layoff staff, due to the Alberta Health Services restrictions, we know it was a difficult decision and was fully supported by Council. These are only temporary layoffs, forced upon us by the province in response to a global health crisis!

Once things settle down, and she does not have to work 50 to 60 hours a week to merge both CAO and CFO's job responsibilities into one job, she will meet with everyone.

To us, it is our responsibility to defend our employees and councillors, who have done nothing wrong. We find it a despicable and cowardly act to start a crisis and to create divisiveness, especially in an election year!

Council has only one employee, the CAO, who answers to all of Council. Direction to the CAO is done by a motion for direction, in a public meeting, and voted upon by all councillors. Under the Municipal Government Act (MGA), an elected official can not interfere with Administration, they can not give direction to any other employee and can not discuss anything regarding town employees due to privacy laws, (such as FOIP) and employment standards.

We still have and will continue to have an open policy. We encourage everyone with concerns to come in front of Council in the proper format, as directed by the MGA and other policies and procedures approved by the Town's Council. We continue to follow previous council guidelines not to participate in social media activities.

We defend everyone's right to their opinion. We can only hope it is expressed in a respectful manner, so it can be dealt with in a respectful manner. We conduct town business in council, not on Facebook. Going forward, we will put our articles in the Thorsby Target. Also, we are in the process of having a simplified, interactive website created.

We invested in a Zoom licence and are now able to conduct digital council meetings for all residents, the information to log on will be provided through our website and the Municipal office. (see link at the end of the article). This will allow multiple residents to remotely attend a council meeting digitally.

Council meetings are still open to the public in-person, but with restrictions for the number of attendees.

We want to thank everyone who called to express concern and to find out what was really going on. This remains a great little community, with most residents being kind and honourable people.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Happy New Year Everyone!!! Dear Editor: To Thorsby Community

I want to start off by saying 2020 was a harsh year filled with many challenges. I'm glad its behind us.

I want to have a conversation of awareness. If we have to deal with provincially mandated closures of our recreation facility, shouldn't there be discussion on other avenues to provide programming and what we might be able to do? Many communities are providing something and this supports community healthiness overall. I'm disappointed when the decision is made harshly to layoff staff, as it always leaves a gaping hole in the community with everyone wondering, now what? Are we truly looking at the big picture on providing service and programming, because the impact of it will have long lasting effects if we don't? Staff are a vital piece in our community that we need in order to keep moving forward on in a positive way. I am struggling with these recent decisions that I'm hearing about.

Our New CAO has taken her place in the community and under Councils direction she has to make operational decisions that undoubtably will impact us all. Some will be supported, some will not be. Council will need to diligently work through it with the community's best interest always in mind. I look forward to seeing details of the budget before it is passed, to get community feedback. Budgets require feedback as it's the community's budget that Council and Administration create.

Another area that troubles me is that in a time of crisis we do not have our FCSS Coordinator or have any indication on how long she will be away. Where do we go to get the answers to the questions we have, and why should we have to speak to Leduc County FCSS when it could be handled by a very competent Thorsby FCSS Coordinator? Do we go without? In a time where it should be all staff on deck to give qualified confidence to the community, is it realistic to have and accept this void? These decisions worry me to my core, and makes me question what service delivery means to Council, because it means something completely different to me, and many will agree.

I continue to advocate for transparency, and it's again disappointing to not see it very easily. Our CAO may be very busy, that I can understand, but you should never refuse to speak to the community when they come calling. One month into this position and already we are questioning all because a call wasn't taken. I want a welcoming CAO, one that builds relationships with the community and buys into our community. Those relationships can go a long way in forging the strength of volunteers to rally together to build and create. They will work tirelessly to serve, because that's what volunteers do if you treat them right. Build a team so that the community continues to see great success. You will fail if you think you can do it on your own and so will Council. The ethical approach of respect and communication is the most powerful tool you can have.

I want to see good decisions made by all so we can enjoy a flourishing community. One that works together and respects differences, that's the only way. My service to my community is a personal one. As we kick off 2021, Alberta's government remains focused on protecting the lives and livelihoods of Albertans. From administering vaccines to ensuring we have strong public health measures to limit the spread of COVID-19, we are working tirelessly to keep Albertans safe.

Alberta's government is leading all major provinces in COVID-19 immunizations. In fact, more than 65 per cent of the vaccines we have received have been administered to vulnerable Albertans and healthcare workers. In total, 33,864 doses of the vaccine have been administered in the province as of Jan. 6, working out to roughly 765 doses per 100,000 Albertans – the highest rate per capita in the country. Our province's phased approach to vaccination prioritizes healthcare workers and our most vulnerable. Eligibility to receive the COVID-19 vaccine will continue to expand as more vaccines arrive in Alberta.

As was announced in December, rapid testing has been expanded to include vulnerable Albertans and has begun at long-term care and designated supportive living facilities in the Edmonton area. Remote and rural hospitals in Alberta are receiving rapid tests, and rapid testing has also been expanded to homeless shelters and centers in both Calgary and Edmonton.

Our government also remains focused on ensuring our children can learn in a safe and thoughtful way. As previously scheduled, schools opened to in-person learning on January 11th. This decision was based on the latest evidence which demonstrates that before the Christmas break, case rates in schools flattened and then dropped, once restrictions on social gatherings were implemented. In September, a clear majority of parents chose in-person learning for their

children during the pandemic, and Alberta's education system has done an excellent job of implementing and following provincial health measures. The return to school occurred with strong guidelines in place to ensure the safety and wellbeing of our staff and students, while also helping restore a sense of normalcy for our children. Alberta's government is actively evaluating the latest public health data to assess if the current level of restrictions need to be adjusted. As of now, families, businesses, organizations and service providers must continue to follow existing public health measures until at least Jan. 21. We recognize that changing health guidelines can be difficult on businesses, in particular, which is why we continue to consult with affected industries and are committed to providing businesses with at least one week's notice before any changes.

The measures that were implemented in December have helped reduce the number of active cases, however, overall case numbers, hospitalizations and positive testing rates continue to remain high. The worst thing we could do right now is increase chances of another wave of cases that would, in turn, jeopardize our healthcare system. We all have a role to play as part of the solution, and we will continue to carefully assess the data to determine what options are available to provide Albertans with more flexibility in their lives. In the meantime, please continue to follow public health measures as we will all need to work together to minimize the spread of COVID-19 in Alberta.

Alberta's government is responding to the COVID-19 pandemic by protecting lives and livelihoods with precise measures to bend the curve of COVID-19, sustain small businesses, and protect Alberta's healthcare system for all.




