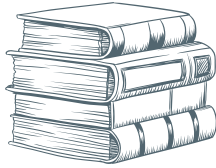

## MLA REPORT

from The Office of MLA Mark Smith,  
Member of the Legislative Assembly  
for Drayton Valley - Devon

Society has always had to struggle with the issue of individual freedom versus societal control. Our individual actions always have consequences to the people that we live with and there is always a tension as to when society should step in and control individual choices. The truth is we want both freedom and control, but where to draw the line is often a subjective decision. Should we allow dangerous recreational pursuits like extreme sports to occur? Where do we limit the consumption of alcohol or drugs? What ideas should be allowed to propagate within society? The list could go on because all of these personal decisions will impact the wider society and it is our health care system, police system, education system, etc. that have to pick up the pieces.

The past 16 months or so has forced every Albertan to reconsider some of our answers regarding freedom and control and what kind of a society we want to live in now that we face Covid-19. Quite frankly, the discussion has often become very divisive. We find ourselves today in a situation where we have a pandemic of the unvaccinated and a health care system that is struggling to deal with the very serious consequences of that reality.

On so many other issues we have landed on the side of individual freedom of choice, often with some societal control. Take for instance the issue of extreme sports. Some people like to jump off the sides of mountains wearing nothing but what I can only describe as a squirrel suit – yet it is obvious to everyone that if anything goes wrong the person will either die or be hospitalized. Either way it is loved ones and society that have to pay for the consequences of that free choice. Yet how far do we go? Do we stop people from mountaineering, skiing, riding ATVs? Generally, we have said that we want to be able to make our own choices regarding recreation and so as a society we are prepared to pay the price for what may be seen as some pretty dangerous choices.

Many Albertans have historically believed that in a free society, individual citizens are best placed to decide if they need to be vaccinated with the result being that the Alberta Government has never mandated vaccines. Yet most of us are willing to entertain the idea that there might come a time when mandatory vaccinations, at least for some segments of society, might be necessary. The government recently repealed the law that would have allowed mandatory vaccinations. Yet that has not

stopped businesses and most recently AHS from saying that a Covid 19 vaccine is a condition of employment. This has left some Albertans in a crisis of conscience. They are unwilling to give up their personal liberty and conscience to be vaccinated. They wonder where their freedom of choice has gone, and other Albertans are left wondering how the unvaccinated can justify endangering vulnerable Albertans and threatening the capacity of our health care system.

As a Conservative I believe that government needs to respect individual rights and freedoms and I tend to land on the side of individual choice rather than societal control. At the same time, I understand the need for society to sometimes intervene in my personal decisions. On this issue, I hope companies and organizations consider individual circumstances before deciding whether to mandate vaccinations for each and every employee, as some people have valid reasons for not wanting vaccines, including health, religion and conscience rights. Liberty is important and, on this issue, starts with the ability to decide what drugs you will allow to be put into your body. But that does not abrogate the individual from the responsibility that they have to the society. You need to make an informed decision. You need to consider not only the consequences of your decisions on yourself but also on the rest of society. For those who truly cannot in full conscience take a Covid 19 vaccine then we in the wider society must be prepared to accommodate and find work arounds that respect their rights and protect the society.

I would also challenge those Albertans who have not yet been vaccinated. Unless you have a conscience issue or a medical reason for not getting vaccinated, please go get vaccinated and do so quickly. Should this 4<sup>th</sup> wave or any future waves threaten our hospital system with the inability to treat Albertans and be overwhelmed by Covid 19 I will understand why those of conscience are not vaccinated but I will have a much harder time understanding why those who have no such issues, the procrastinators, are prepared to endanger their own lives, our health care system and those who are dependent upon it.

### **Village of Warburg - Mayor**

#### ***What prompted you to run for mayor?***

KEVIN MAINE (*incumbent*) - I'm the current mayor and been on council for 8 years, there are unfinished projects I would like to see completed. We currently have no debt and I believe taxpayers dollars are better spent on projects and not interest. We leverage all levels of government provincial, federal, and municipal monies along with grants to proceed with our projects. I believe if we have all the amenities of the larger centres and lower housing costs we can attract more citizens and businesses at the same time.

DWAYNE MAYR - I have enjoyed my time on council and would really like to offer a leadership role, helping to make things better. We have a great community here and I believe we should be letting the world know we exist, to help promote development and growth. My long and varied volunteering and work gives me a broad range of skills that I believe give me unique qualifications to serve the people of Warburg as Mayor.

#### ***What are your goals should you be elected?***

MAINE - To get phase 2/3 of the arena completed, the 1st phase the dressing rooms have attracted out of town teams and are the envy of any hockey team that comes to our facility. It has increased our income by \$30,000.00 to \$40,000.00 per year and that will only continue to rise as more teams experience the facility. Continue to upgrade our green areas to workable recreation areas and to extend work on the trail system. I would like to see the completion of the economic development plan and start to implement it. We are constantly looking for ways to attract developers and businesses and also ways to continue to support existing businesses. Sometimes the simplest things can spur growth. I lobbied to have the bylaw changed for absentee landowners that did not maintain their lots. By increasing fees for grass cutting and snow removal, lots came up for sale. This resulted in 5 to 6 million dollars in residential growth in the village. One of the local builders bought the lots and built houses.

MAYR - There are many, in no particular order -

Promote economic development and growth which in turn will increase our tax base. Maintain fiscal responsibility and continue operating the Village with no debt. Continue to maintain our Nurse Practitioner position. Maintain our existing infrastructure, pave more streets and build more sidewalks. Maintain existing recreational amenities and promote increased recreational activities. Maintain and improve our relationships with our regional partners. Promote Warburg authentic living with rural roots and great community spirit. Improve engagement between Village council, Administration and Residents.

#### ***What is the greatest challenge facing Warburg right now?***

MAINE - One of the village's greatest challenges is attracting new business. It is very hard to compete against the big box stores when most of the residents commute to larger centres for work and do their shopping on the way home. One solution would be to attract a large employer so our work force stays local and will tend to shop more locally. I believe we have more advantages than challenges. We just need to promote ourselves more. Warburg is a great place to live and raise a family.

MAYR - Continuing to operate the Village with a limited tax base, rising expenses due to changes in government funding structure and threat of reduced provincial funding.

#### ***How are you going to work with neighbouring municipalities to provide what the community needs at a reasonable cost?***

MAINE - I totally believe in working regionally to save costs. I currently chair the 39/20 Alliance and we have saved costs by negotiating for water meters and garbage contracts. We have shared equipment and public works personnel. We hire Calmar's street cleaner, this helps them with costs and we don't have upfront costs of owning, storing and maintaining one. We have spearheaded many other joint projects and are constantly looking for more ways to reduce costs. I currently meet once a month with all the mayors in Leduc County. We are working on a Memorandum of Understanding to purchase good used equipment from the larger municipalities. They have policies to replace equipment every so many years and we will get the first chance to purchase it before it goes to auction. We are also working on a regional emergency management plan. We already have many other regional plans in place. We work

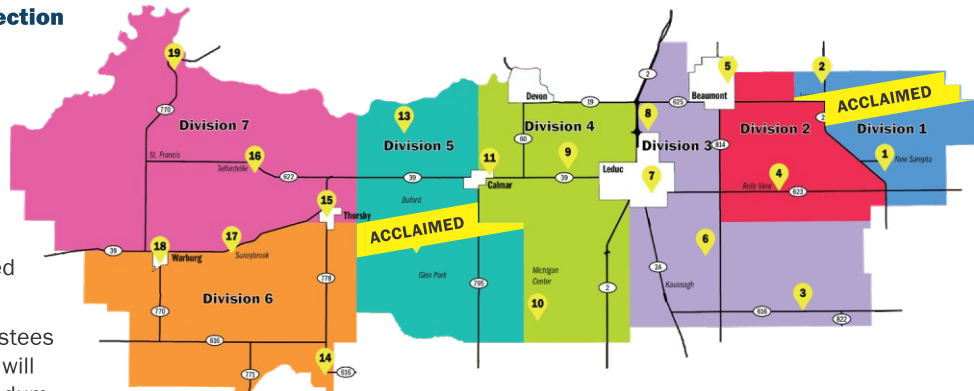

### **Village of Warburg - Council**

*NOTE: There are only four councillors for the Village of Warburg, so all candidates were acclaimed.*

#### ***What prompted you to run for town council?***

RICK HART - The reason I put my name up for Warburg Council is that I thought I have experience to offer the village. I was on council in Thorsby for 13 years - 3 years as Mayor & 10 years as a councillor. I didn't run in 2017 as I felt I needed some time to recharge my battery. I moved to Warburg just over 3 years ago. I feel I have a lot of experience to offer my new home town. I worked in sale - ag, vehicles, and industrial. My last job was with Martin Deerline in Warburg for a couple years.

CODY HENDERSON - I had decided to put my name forward for council with the aspiration to better serve my community. Not in the hopes that I could change the way of life here, instead that I could continue to build the culture and way of life that has flourished here in Warburg.

IVAN LAING (*incumbent*) - It all started a few years ago and prior to the last election. I was raking leaves in my front yard on 52nd Avenue when the late George Broadbent strolled up the sidewalk. George stopped and we talked for a while as we sometimes did. This time as the election was coming up, he talked about his views and why the residents of the village should have a desire to maintain a local government, and that in recent years the level of engagement has been in decline. I didn't get to know George very well but his huge smile and the spring in his step despite being over 90 years old was such an encouragement, and led me to follow his exhortation to run for council 4 years ago. I really enjoyed serving my first term over the last 4 years and look forward to the next 4!

STEVEN SWARTZ (*incumbent*) - This term I am running for council to help as much as I can for our community. We have also started some great projects that I would like to see to completion as I feel they will be great additions to Warburg.

#### ***What are your goals should you be elected?***

HART - My goal on Council will be to see that Warburg maintains its friendly, rural, agricultural feel while growing compatible economic development. I also want to work with the group and organizations that work so hard for the community.

HENDERSON - I would like to create programs to bring our community's older generation closer with the younger generation, such as a community garden. Our aging population has so much invaluable knowledge to offer our youth. Second, I would like to see our community centre utilized more often. If elected, I would propose a fitness facility be

constructed within the community centre.

LAING - I'm happy to be already elected by acclamation for my second term. My goals include acting as a voice for the residents on ANY issues which may be of concern to them, drainage improvement, roadway construction and maintenance program improvement; improvements to park spaces including pathways and trails; and working to improve relationships with the business community and school.

SWARTZ - My goals this term are to see that several projects get finished and continue making decisions with council based on what I believe would best benefit everyone in Warburg, not just a selected few.

#### ***What is the greatest challenge facing Warburg right now?***

HART - I believe we need to work with our neighboring communities. I was one of the initial members of the 39/20 Alliance. I was vice chairman of the Leduc Regional Housing Foundation for 7 years and sat on numerous other inter-municipal boards and committees.

HENDERSON - I would say one of the greatest issues facing Warburg right now is the lack of entertainment for the village's youth. Growing up in a small Alberta town myself, there wasn't much to do outside of helping out on the farm and school. With that being said, there are lots of fantastic programs for younger children in the village, however I feel our young adults are left out.

LAING - Years of fiscal prudence by village staff and previous councils, along with many hours contributed by hard working and caring volunteers have put Warburg in a very good position in most respects! The great challenges facing so many other Alberta communities have been well managed and are not yet a challenge in Warburg. We should all be proud of this. The greatest challenge right now I think would be education. Though the village has only ever grown (slowly) in population, the school has had fluctuating enrollment numbers. Since education funding is based almost entirely on enrollment, there is a big challenge in maintaining robust education programs. With lesser educational programs offered, parents have even more incentive to pursue alternative education options leading to lesser enrollment. I believe that the school is a fundamental part of a healthy community in Warburg, and that efforts made on improving the programs and facilities offered will have a positive impact on the community.

SWARTZ - There are a few challenges Warburg is facing now such as attracting families and making them want to stay in our village. As well as drainage sloping issues all over the village that were overlooked many years ago during original planning and construction. We have been making lots of progress with both of these but neither is a quick or easy fix.



**What else would you like voters to know about you and your bid to be a Village Councillor?**

HART - WE WILL GET OVER THIS PANDEMIC AND ENJOY GETTING TOGETHER AGAIN!

HENDERSON - In these times, we need our community more than ever. I believe in grassroots ideology and bottom-up government. I believe in an "open door policy", to which will always lend an ear to residents' concerns. I'm in the business of solutions, not evasion.

LAING - The last couple of years have been different for many of us! There of course has been a lot to complain about. Please understand that your council and village staff are not members of the AB or federal governments, we are your friends and neighbours! In 4 years on council, I had the opportunity to engage with a few of you, but not nearly enough! I strongly encourage you to reach out to the village and make your ideas and issues known to council. I would love to sit down and talk with you about them. My contact info is available at the village office.

SWARTZ - Going into this 4 years ago, I figured I already helped out in the community lots but wanted to do a little more. Once I became a councillor I realized just how much needed to be done. I watched CAO Pankewitz and Mayor Maine step up time and time again when no one else could or would and showed me just how selfless some people really can be. In the next 4 years, I hope to continue learning and growing along their side and doing the best I possibly can for everyone in the village.

**What is your favourite breakfast food?**

HART - Ham & egg bagel.

HENDERSON - I'm a traditionalist when it comes to breakfast! My favorite is bacon and eggs, and a good cup of coffee. But let's be real, all breakfast foods are the best ones!

LAING - I do love food and especially breakfast food! Breakfast for dinner is definitely a thing around our house and something my wife, 3 kids and I enjoy a lot. Hard to pick one food but I guess it's gotta be a classic eggs Benedict. The mouthfuls of salty smoked ham with eggs and their soft bright orange yolks, smothered in buttery hollandaise and with a slight crunch of the toasted English muffin, GET IN MY BELLY!

SWARTZ - My favourite breakfast food would have to be bacon or leftover pizza, so I guess a combination of the two would be ideal.

  - Water drainage problems in the Hamlet of Sunnybrook.
  - Paving of road in the Sarvas Estates.
  - Looking at subdivision planning and costs.
  - Unpaid oil and gas taxes need to be addressed.
  - We need to make sure that when we have abandoned oil sites that they are reclaimed so that problems with clubroot and weeds are not brought in from truck haulers and contaminated soil.
  - Putting pressure on the Alberta Government to repair trouble spots on Hwy 616 West of Hwy 778.

# The Breton Brothers Adventures in Alberta Chapter 3

I left off the second installment about the Breton's after their return from serving in WW1. Basil Breton moved to Vancouver Island to manage a hotel. Douglas, Laurence and Billie Breton joined forces in operating the Telfordville store, post office and cream station. Billie and Laurence ran the store, with Laurence being the chief cream tester. Billie would continue to operate the store for the next 20 years. Douglas looked after the post office, bookkeeping and hauling freight from Leduc. Also, Douglas was becoming involved in local politics, lobbying for the extension of the railroad through the area. In 1922, the Alberta Government announced the Lacombe & North Western Railway would be extended from Rimbey to Hoadley. Lobbying continued through the UFA Local 1053, with Douglas acting as spokesperson: meetings were held, petitions circulated and delegations to Provincial ministers arranged, but with little success from 1922-1924. A break came in February 1925 when it was announced the railway would be extended 22 miles north from Hoadley, establishing a new rail terminal, and a yet to be named hamlet. It would be December 1926 before the line was put into service. The new hamlet was named "Breton" in appreciation of the work carried out by Douglas Breton. In June 1926, Douglas Breton was elected as MLA for the Leduc constituency. While the extension of the railway to Breton was gratifying to Douglas, there was still work to be done to link the railway to Leduc. Douglas could now press for the extension of the railway from within the government. Once the location of the new terminal and hamlet was determined, businesses started to establish. One of the first was the Laurence Breton family, who moved from Telfordville in April 1926 to open a grocery store. For the next ten years Laurence would operate the Red and White grocery store. The Depression

of the 1930's took a toll on many businesses, and in 1936 Laurence sold the grocery store. Laurence and family would leave Breton moving to Campbell River, BC, where he was employed in a department store. Laurence passed away in 1965 at the age of 80. In 1927 Douglas again tried to get the railway extended without success. It is interesting to note that the UFA Government of Alberta was in serious financial trouble at the time ... sound a little bit familiar. However, in 1928 the government announced they had accepted the offer from the CPR to purchase the Lacombe & North Western, and by 1932 the railway reached Leduc.

Douglas would run for re-election in 1930, but lost his seat to Liberal Arthur Mitchell. He returned to Telfordville to farm, and as secretary - treasurer for the MD of Pioneer. In 1934 the decision was made to return to England, where he took up farming again. During WWII Douglas served as a training officer with the Royal Air Force and after the war worked for Army Records, as well as farming. Douglas Breton passed away in 1953 at the age 70. His daughter wrote of his death ... "He died in 1953 with so much of his heart and dreams still in the Canadian west". While Douglas Breton would not return to Canada his name does live on in the name of our Village.

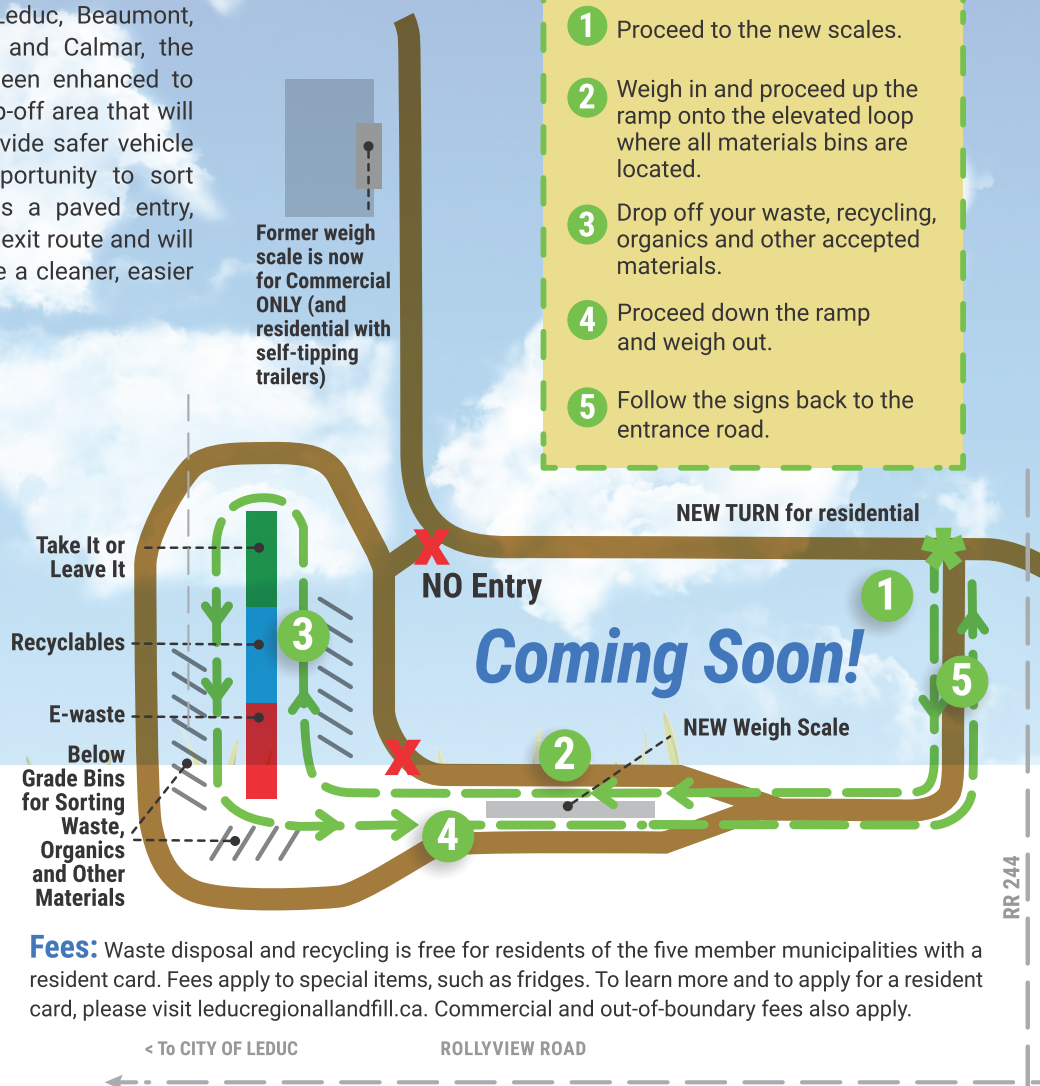

### **Leduc County Councilor - Division 6** (Rr10 and west; south of TWP 492 through Thorsby, south highway 39)

#### ***What prompted you to run for county council?***

GLENN BELOZER (*incumbent*) - To the residents of Leduc County Division 6. My decision to run for re-election was a simple one. After the years as your representative I gained a huge amount of experience and knowledge. I felt these two assets needed to be used for the betterment of our division.

SAM KOBELUCK - We need to have a strong voice and opinion on matters at the county level so that it is in the best interest of the county as a whole as well as the electorate of Division 6. After listening to people in my area, they felt that their concerns and views were not being addressed west of the 5th meridian. I feel that all parts of the county need to be looked at. If we work together, be transparent and accountable to the people, great things can happen. I believe that I can offer a great leadership voice to the county as well as to Division 6. I will work for you so that we are not left behind. I have a passion for our people and their concerns and that is why I am running for the election on Oct. 18th.

#### ***What are your goals should you be elected?***

BELOZER - My goals for the next term. The Rural Road Initiative needs to be carried on. Working with my fellow councillors to get our rural roads in the best condition we can. Second, I am working as a member of Alberta care/co-ordinated action for recycling enterprises and the Leduc regional landfill to possibly secure a plastic collection depot for Leduc County. Plastic to be collected would be grain bags, net wrap plastic, twine, chemical jugs, and silage cover plastic. Unfortunately, these plastics now are being burned or holes dug and covered. Neither of these options are good for the environment.

KOBELUCK - My priority would be to understand the issues that most affect my constituents and then to advocate powerfully for them. We need to make the county more transparent so that the people know what we are doing and why we have voted a certain way. Elected officials need to be accountable to our ratepayers.

#### ***What is the greatest challenge facing the western part of Leduc County right now?***

BELOZER - I feel the greatest challenge in the western part of the county is economic developments. Location is not our friend. Promoting development is an ongoing problem.

KOBELUCK - Taxes, and road construction and maintenance are probably the two areas that we need

to look at. Dust suppression, fixing and paving of roads, drainage, bridge repair and crime rate. Bylaws and policies also need to be looked at in the planning department.

#### ***How are you going to work with neighbouring municipalities to provide what the community needs at a reasonable cost?***

BELOZER - Working with our neighboring municipalities has been one of my strong assets. I'm in constant conversation with our neighbor county's councillors on issues like possibly finding a cheaper and better dust suppression. I also am in contact often with councillors across Alberta. Many different issues are discussed among ourselves at conferences.

KOBELUCK - Communities within Leduc County have their own municipal government and tax base. We need to work with these communities with our cost share agreements that are in place and help them out because Leduc County residents are using their recreation centres, halls and recreational fields. These costs of operation and infrastructure maintenance should be shared by both parties on a percentage basis.

#### ***What else would you like voters to know about you and your bid to be a County Councillor?***

BELOZER - As a lifelong resident of Leduc County my knowledge of the county is extensive. I work at the council table to keep division 6 in the forefront of conversation.

KOBELUCK - I live on Range Road 20 just south of Hwy 39 and attended Thorsby High School – graduated – went to the University of Alberta with a teaching degree majoring in Biological Sciences. I have taught for 37 years and after retirement in 2007 became a school board trustee for 10 years in county west. It was during this role that I had a great opportunity and understanding how the political system works. We represented the whole division but the interests of county west – Warburg and Thorsby were always on my mind. Over the years, I have worked on numerous advisory boards on the provincial and local level and volunteered my time within the community. I believe that I have strong people skills, a high demand for accuracy and discipline, am a dedicated team player, approachable and a good listener. For these reasons I would seek your vote to be a County Councillor.

#### ***What is your favourite breakfast food?***

SCOBIE - As the County does not have Health Care expertise we rely on AHS to guide our safe work programs and make decisions accordingly.

FOULLIARD - I have always been passionate about people and I am ready to commit to being the liaison between the people and the county. Debating and fighting for Division 7 will be my priority as Division 7 is the biggest division while also being the least populated which often makes us feel forgotten. 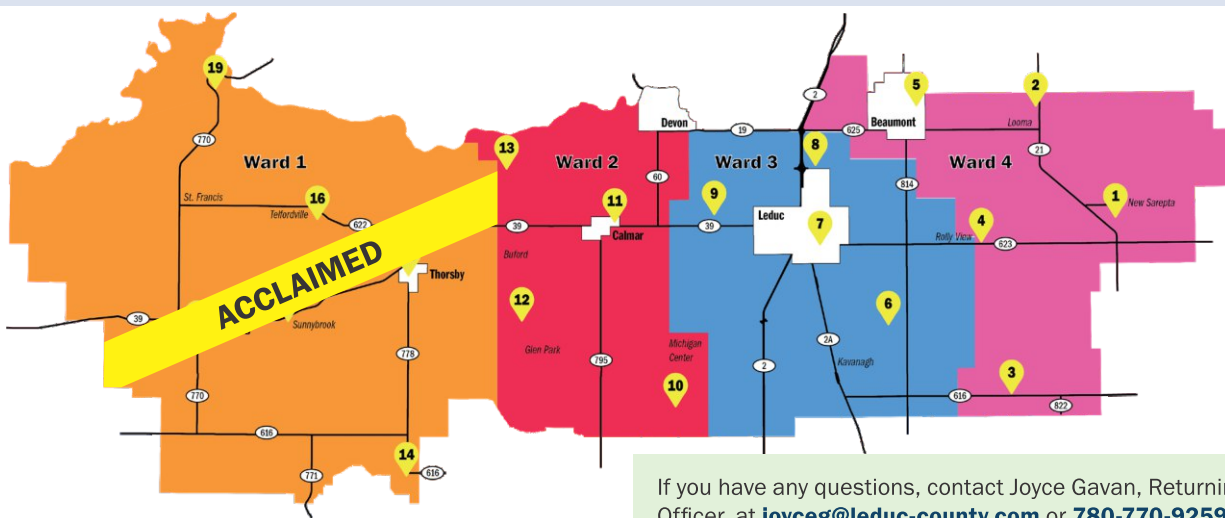

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## Provincial Referendum Vote - Equalization

**Referendum Question** - Should section 36(2) of the *Constitution Act, 1982* - Parliament and the government of Canada's commitment to the principle of making equalization payments - be removed from the constitution?

### **What is Equalization?**

Equalization is a program, first introduced in 1957 and later enshrined in legislation by the *Constitution Act, 1982*, that aims to ensure all Canadians receive relatively the same level of services for approximately the same level of taxation, regardless of where in the country they live. The legislation recognizes that various areas of the country have different resources and economic potential and seeks to accommodate those differences by the redistribution of tax dollars, based on need.

### **How does it work?**

When Canadians pay their taxes each year, a portion of those monies go into a federal equalization pool. This pool is then divided up amongst all provinces (territories are not part of the program) based upon need. The goal is to raise the fiscal capacity of provinces that lie below the national average so they are able to offer a more equitable level of public services. These funds are also provided to the provinces in an unrestricted manner so can be used however premiers and their governments see fit.

The federal government uses a complex formula to determine how much each province gets in what are sometimes called 'transfer payments.' It takes into account a number of factors including personal income taxes, business income taxes, consumption taxes, property taxes and natural resource revenues and are calculated on a per capita basis. Natural resource revenues are only partially considered, however, so as not to unduly punish provinces with large amounts of income from this source (before 2004, this was not the case).

The equalization formula is amended by the federal government in consultation with the premiers. The current formula was negotiated in 2007 by then Prime Minister Stephen Harper and

his cabinet (which included Premier Jason Kenney), and the premiers and their cabinets, with a small change coming in 2009 to limit the total amount a province could receive. In 2018, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and his cabinet proposed the extension of the current formula, to which the premiers largely agreed, save for Alberta and Saskatchewan who felt not enough consultation had taken place.

Equalization creates the concept of 'have' and 'have not' provinces. A 'have' province is a province whose taxpayers contribute more to the program than the province receives from the federal government or is a net contributor. A 'have not' province has its taxpayers contribute less to equalization than is paid by the feds to the provincial government, making it a net receiver. *Under no circumstances does a 'have' province cut a cheque and send it to a 'have not' province - all transfer payments come from the federal government and every province receives some money.*

### **Who has the power to make change suggested in the referendum questions?**

While the principle of equalization is enshrined in the constitution, the specifics of how the program works is flexible, allowing it to evolve with the nation. The referendum question, however, does not ask about changing the formula, rather, it asks about amending the constitution. To do this, an amendment must have the agreement of the House of Commons, the Senate, and a minimum number of provincial legislatures, which means at least seven provinces representing at least 50% of Canada's population, referred to as the 7+50 rule.

### **Why are we having this referendum?**

Premier Jason Kenney, as indicated above, feels that the current system is unfair to Alberta as a 'have' province. He is seeking the negotiating leverage that a 'yes' result might confer. However, given the challenging constitutional amending formula, it is unclear whether it would make any difference on actually removing section 32(2) from the constitution.

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## KEVIN MAINE SEEKING RE-ELECTION FOR VILLAGE OF WARBURG MAYOR



Here are a few points on my personal side.

I was born and raised in the buck creek area. My grandparent's lived in Warburg. In my younger years, I competed in many curling bonspiels and baseball tournaments in the village & surrounding communities. I have been married for 32 wonderful years to my wife, Helen. We have one son, and one granddaughter. I graduated from Frank Maddock High School, and started my career journey, in the oil patch. we farmed for several years before starting my own business, building and renovating houses for several years. I finished up my career path in financial services before running for council. I believe my varied experiences has made me very impactful in cost savings & planning. I am a level 2 ice maker, and certified competitive coach. I am the president of the curling club, and at my time of this position I have helped to increase membership to 4 nights a week, from 1. I have also had the privilege to accompany young curling athletes to two Alberta winter games & 4 provincial play downs. in the past 10 years, we brought the highschool zone qualifiers to the village, on several occasions. we have done approximately \$150,000 in improvements to the facility. I am a member of the arena board & the Agricultural society. I believe in giving back to our community so our citizens can enjoy a better quality of life, regardless of their financial situations.

I am running on the platform that represents our past, present & future projects.

In my first 4 years on council, we set the groundwork for major projects. The spray park/RV park & the 3 phase upgrade to our arena. I also introduced the village enhancement fund, which is to go towards projects that I believe will help attract more citizens to our area. We increased the fees for the absentee lot owners for snow removal, and grass cutting.

The 1st phase of the arena has been completed, & was made possible by grants and cost sharing with the County of Leduc. the response from everyone that has used the arena has all been positive and they are looking forward to phase 2 & 3 being completed being completed. This will be the envy of the county, when it is complete. The splash park/RV park was made possible by grants applied for, by our AG Society, local business' & individual donations. We are very grateful to longtime resident Mike Gidosh, who left a large donation to go towards the development of the splash park & in turn council found it only fitting on naming the park after him. The enhancement fund is now at the point that we can start to develop our green areas and other projects, that may attract new citizens. We are always open to suggestions, of what the citizens of Warburg would like to see in our village. By increasing the fees for snow removal & grass cutting has resulted in a few positive things. First, lots came up for sale and have houses on the, due to our local builders. Second, the overall appearance of the empty lots have improved, with more frequent maintenance. Third, the sidewalks are being kept clear of snow & ice, so that the citizens of our village can enjoy their stroll, safely.

Other projects that have been completed while I have been in office. Renovations to the office, inside and out. Our Boulevards have been covered in recycled rubber, which has reduced maintenance costs. There have been several paving projects, and sidewalks being replaced or extended in places where there were none.

A toboggan hill was built at no cost to our residents. The land was supplied by the Black Gold School Division, the dirt was supplied by the village and the hill was constructed by border paving, at no cost. With indoor restrictions, the hill has seen a lot of use when winter permits. we have installed security cameras through out the village, which has resulted in several arrests. We now have a nurse practitioner that was made possible by Leduc, Beaumont, Devon PCN, the County Of Leduc and the Village. we pruned our trees, one of the village's greatest assets. We received around 1000 trees with the support of Capital Power. We have also received money from Fortis to plant fruit trees throughout our village. We also, in my first term, set up a drainage program. This is ongoing. The first stages were on the west side of the village and this year, we are developing a plan to help with the water flow on the east side of the village.

Projects that are not so visible. We have started the process for an economical development that is still a work in progress. we have developed a 90 acre light industrial park plan for the land next to the highway on the north side of the village. we have upgraded the new water plant and are deluging the lagoon this year. There has been a draft plan approved to develop a trail system and develop our green areas. We have updated policies and by laws to bring them up to date with current situations.

Currently as Mayor I sit on a Regional Assessment Review Board and the Regional Sub Division appeal Board. I chair the 39/20 Alliance Committee that is made up of Breton, Calmar and Warburg. Currently, the alliance is working on a promotional video for our three communities. I believe in cooperating regionally whenever we can. It has resulted in saving money and sharing services. I sit on the Leduc Regional Housing foundation, which manages the Cloverleaf Manor in the village and I chair the finance committee for the foundation. The foundation manages properties in all the municipalities in the Leduc County. I'm also the director of emergency management and have spent many hours updating our disaster management plan. Due to the present situation with COVID I have been on daily, weekly and monthly calls with several different government departments for the last 20 months. I also am the representative for our fire department.

In the next 4 years I would like to see the completion of the 2nd and 3rd phase of the arena. the 1st phase has attracted more teams from farther away to our facility and the second phase will save long range costs by upgrading our ice plant and zamboni room and with improvements to the ice area it will match the appearance of the new dressing rooms. The 3rd phase is a complete renovation to the front end which is in desperate need of a major overhaul. This will not only benefit our village citizens but our athletes from the county and surrounding area. I would like to see the development of our green areas and our trail system. Continue to find ways to attract new business and retain existing businesses. While in office we have changed land use bylaws, we have changed setbacks, and we have reduced the price of commercial lots. This has resulted in lot sales and 2 new businesses coming soon and several looking. I am always open to suggestions and ideas that will better our community.

I believe that this village has more than most municipalities our size offer. We just need to promote it more. My only job, besides volunteering, is the position of mayor. I believe that you need to be fully involved in the running of the village, as well as being involved on the volunteer side, vote to re-elect your current full time Mayor Kevin Maine. 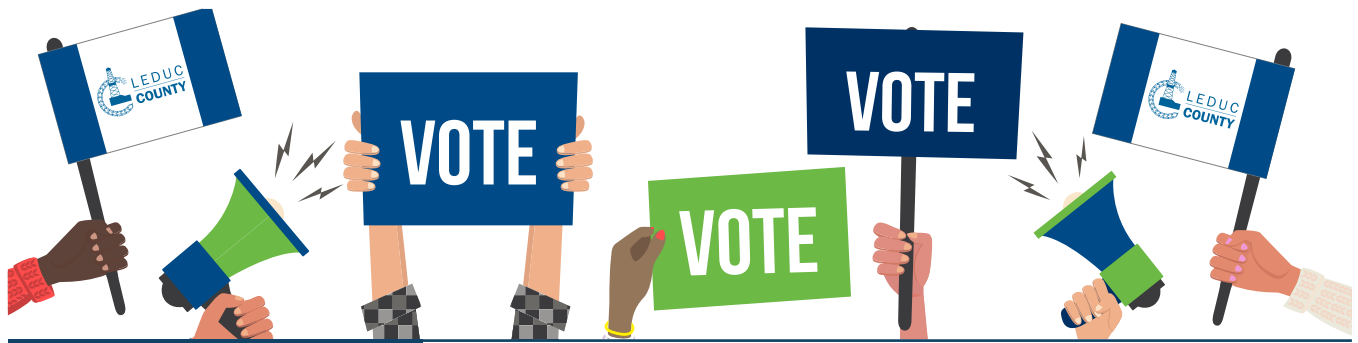

## IDENTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS

*Local Authorities Election Act (Section 35)*

Eligible voters must provide proof of identity and current residence to vote for councillor, school trustee(s) and Senate.

As per Leduc County's Voter Identification Bylaw (Bylaw 5-13), voters must produce the following for inspection by a deputy returning officer of the voting station:

► **one piece** of valid government-issued identification containing the voter's photograph, current address and name

**OR**

► **two pieces** of identification from the following list:

If the deputy returning officer is not satisfied that the identification verifies the identity and age of the person seeking to vote, they make the final decision as to whether or not the person is allowed to vote.

- are 18 years old
- are a Canadian citizen
- are a resident of Leduc County on election day (Oct. 18)

Leduc County does not prepare a voter list. You must complete a declaration at the voting station that confirms you are eligible to vote. You can only vote in one jurisdiction, even if you have more than one residence.

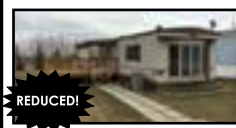
