BRETON RCMP INVESTIGATE FATAL COLLISION ON TWP 470

Wetaskiwin County, Alta. – On Dec. 12, 2021 at approximately 4:10 a.m., Breton RCMP responded to a single vehicle collision on Township Road 470 near Highway 22 in Wetaskiwin County.

Preliminary investigation revealed that a truck was travelling eastbound on Township Road 470 when the vehicle left the roadway and rolled. The driver of the truck, a 27-year-old female from Wetaskiwin County was pronounced deceased on scene by Emergency Medical Services.

The RCMP Collision Analyst attended the scene. Breton RCMP with the assistance of the RCMP Collision Analyst continue to investigate the cause of the collision. No further updates are anticipated and the name of the deceased will not be released.





Christmas Budgeting

When you're out shopping for friends and relatives, you're bound to come across some glorious item that you absolutely must have. However, remind yourself that this is the season for giving, not receiving.


6. Get Creative



Breton Community Hall Rental Rates for Community Groups

The rental rates needed to be clarified for non-profit groups. There has been some expectations in the past that community groups get free rent. CAO Terri Wiebe explained that there are still expenses like utilities, maintenance and cleaning required. During COVID-19 it is required to have a professional sanitize between rentals therefore a minimum fee should be required. The fees will be decided on a per group basis.

Committee Reports

Councillor Barrett reported on the Physician Recruitment committee who will be holding a convention in 2022.

Mayor Tornack commented on how many great ideas and success with the Kick off to Christmas in her Breton & District Ag Society report.

Councillor Parkyns report on Breton FCSS included mention some great programs and services offered. There was also mention of a surplus in the budget that needed to be used. Councilor Barker said FCSS was considering purchasing a TV monitor to put in the entrance of the hall which would display curling photos and advertisements. The council made a motion to allow Deanna at FCSS spend the rest of the FCSS Budget on this and a number of

other items for the community.

In Councillor Sheaves repot on the Library she mentioned they hired Dustin who works Friday and Saturday. They are also looking to replace the flooring the Library which is much needed. The library should have most of the money needed depending on how much it costs. CAO Terri Wiebe said she can look into possible grants for upgrades to the library. The Council ask the CAO if she would get Gail Amendt to provide 3 quotes for the project.

New Business

The Mayor and Council received a letter from the Breton Elks with some concerns with the new Community Hall including the kitchen design. The CAO was directed to respond with a letter explaining the history of construction and to let them know that unfortunately they cannot change the kitchen but the Community Hall is not yet complete.

There was discussion over who should have keys to the community hall. The CAO said it was an operational decision and all keys should be signed out each time. The Council will have more discussion on this topic.

Advertising was approved for the Brick fundraising campaign for the Community Hall & for the Breton Golf Course Membership special.

Council voted unanimously to waive the Hall rental fee for Breton Christmas Wishes.

An invitation to attend a session on the APPS transition study was offered to the Mayor and Council. This study is put on by the Alberta Government to discuss the potential of establishing an Alberta Police Service to replace the RCMP. This was accepted as information.

The Mulhurst Legion requested a donation for their event. Council approved the request for a round of golf at the Breton Golf Course and 2 nights at the Campground.

Mayor Tornack requested the Village cover the cost of the AG conference registration fee. Council agreed it was a worthwhile conference and her request was accepted.

The preliminary budget and November Revenue and Expenses were presented.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

To the Editor:

After listening to several Brazeau Council proposals/motions to spend millions on hard surfacing, the following comments appear appropo.

Over the last 4 or 5 years, the County has overspent their revenue by about \$25 million. This \$25 million comes from unrestricted reserves, which are now down to about \$5 million. This <u>overspending is unsustainable!</u> Currently, total revenues are unknown.

What is our council doing about it? Proposing several million to be spend on hard surfacing of roads?

There are several issues here. It should be noted that hard surfacing is a luxury, not needed by anyone. Should not those that receive the luxury pay for it? That is, does it meet the "public good" category?

At one meeting, a councillor suggested that users of county ball diamonds should contribute funds (from fund raising) to do so. Interesting that this same councillor never suggested that those who received the benefit of hard surfacing should pay for it. Why would the rest of taxpayers want to pay for the benefit of a very few?

The only fair way to appropriate paving funds is to use a traffic count. Unless a road is used 1000 times a day (or more), **NO** hard surfacing should be considered.

Alternatively, the Council could impose a "local improvement tax" for those that get pavement. This tax would be assessed for a certain length of time (e.g., 20 years) after which it would be removed.

It was proposed by Council that resurfacing money should come from debentures, which puts repayment into the future (no savings here).

Is this not another step to fiscal insolvency? We were once one of the better-off counties in the province.


The Bible Truth Page What is God's Will Concerning Healing?

The answer is simple, God's will is that all would be in good health all the time, and I can prove this from His own Word. I will start with Exodus 15:26. In the last part of the verse, God identified Himself as "the Lord that healeth thee". When God brought his people out of Egypt, "there was not one feeble person among their tribes" Psalm 105:37. There were about 600 000 men besides women and children that left Egypt (Exodus 12:37), and nobody was sick or weak. There are several healings recorded in the Old Testament, but I would like to look at the New Testament now.

We can know God's will by looking at what Jesus did, because He said in John 6:38 "For I came down from heaven, not to do mine own will, but the will of Him that sent me." And Jesus said in Hebrews 10:7 "Then said I, Lo, I come (in the volume of the book it is written of me,) to do thy will, O God." So what did Jesus do while He was on earth? Acts 10:38 sums it up, "How God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power: who went about doing good and healing all that were oppressed of the devil; for God was with Him." Notice that it says He HEALED ALL THAT WERE OPPRESSED OF THE DEVIL. That means that sickness is oppression of the devil, and Jesus did good and healed the people because God was with Him. Also notice that if Jesus did good in healing the people who were oppressed by the devil, then sickness must be evil. Matthew 4:24 "And His fame went throughout all Syria: and they brought unto Him all sick people that were taken with divers diseases and torments, and those which were possessed with devils, and those which where lunatic, and those that had the palsy; and He healed them." Matthew 12:15 "But when Jesus knew it, He withdrew himself from thence: and great multitudes followed Him, and He healed them all." Notice that Jesus healed them all, not just the people that had faith or the people in His "good books". He healed every one of them. In Luke 19:10, Jesus said, "For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." The word "save" in this verse is translated from the Greek word sozo which is defined in the Strong's Concordance as "to save, that is, to deliver or protect, heal, preserve, save, make whole." So according to Luke 19:10, Jesus came to seek and to save and to HEAL the lost. The Greek word sozo is also used in John 3:15-17: "That whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have eternal life. For God so loved the world, that He gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not His Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through Him might be saved." Did you see that?!! "That the world through him might be saved." Saved is sozo, saved and healed!!! That is exactly what Jesus did. He saved and healed people and he did it because it is the Father's will.

As Jesus said, He came to do the Father's will and that is exactly what He was doing when He went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed of the devil. Here is another place where Jesus said why He came. John 10:10: "The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and to destroy: I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." Sickness and disease is not abundant life; health and healing is abundant life!! I would also like to add that "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday and to day and for ever," (Hebrews 13:8). Jesus healed then and He is still healing people today, because it is God's will for people to be healed and free from oppression.


