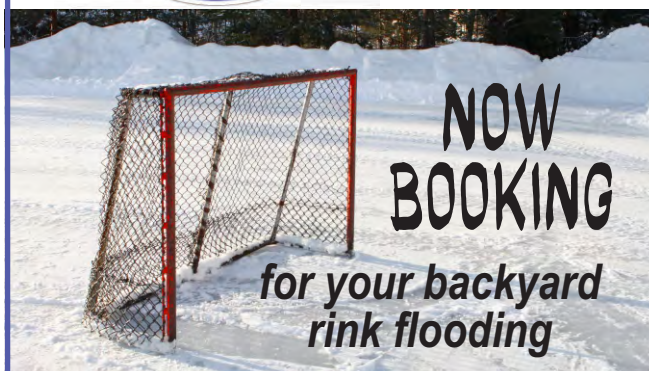

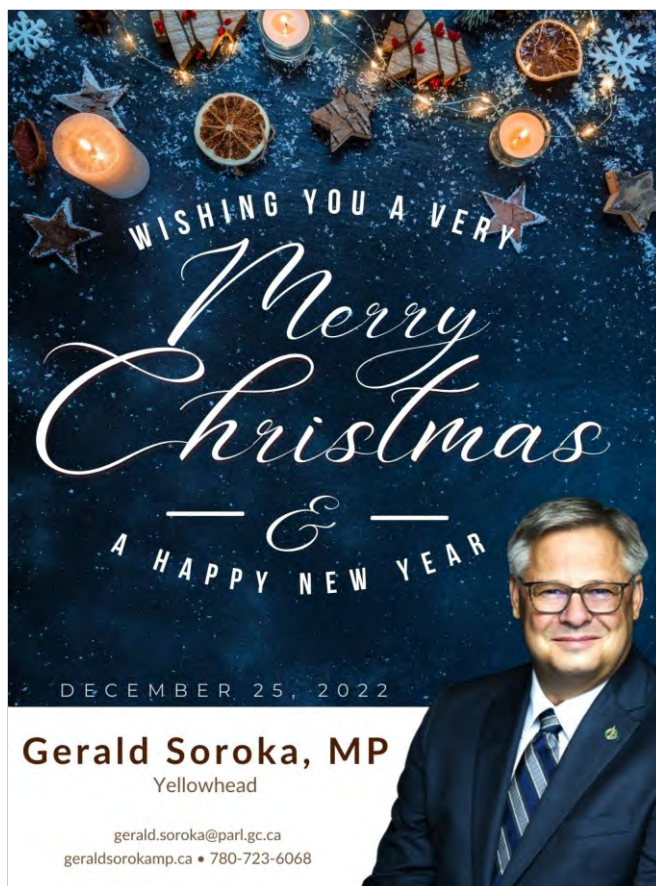
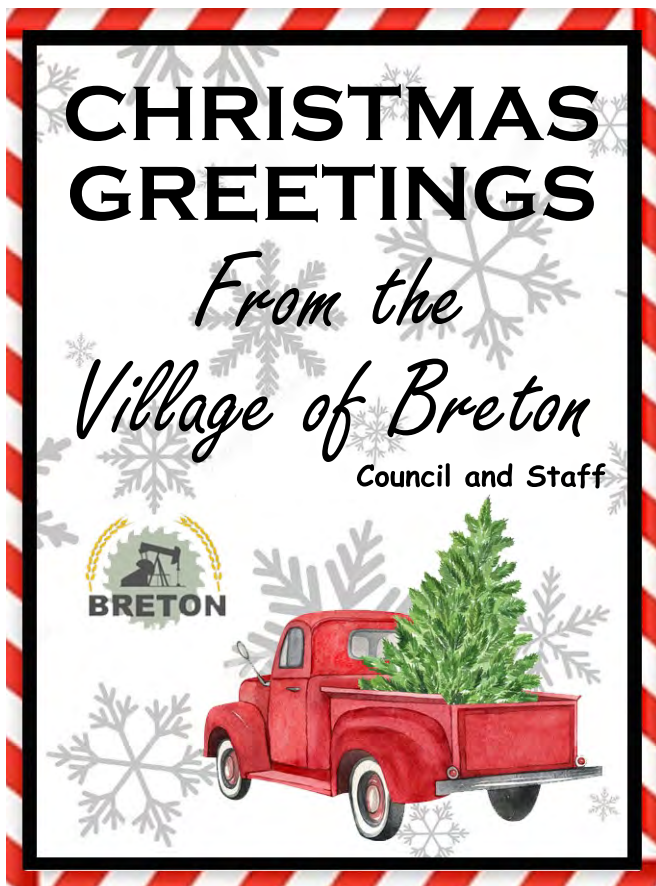

Wellness Calendar Project is Back - Our Community Christmas Calendars are here! Breton and Area FCSS together with the Rural Mental Health Project are putting together a Community Calendar with positive messaging around Mental Health and Wellness. You can pick up your calendar at the Village of Breton Office or the Breton Municipal Library.

The Adult Low Impact Exercise Program is continuing. This class runs from 10:00 – 11:00 am. on Wednesday mornings. Please watch for further information or call our office at 780-696-3636. Equipment is provided. This class will focus on toning, balance, increased mobility, strength gains, and increased flexibility. Participants will be able to either do the exercise standing or sitting, which ever their ability will allow. This program is facilitated by Cassie Kreil a certified instructor. Participants will be asked to pay a small fee of \$1/class. Join today and start to get fit with friends. This is a drop-in group so you are welcome to start attending at any time throughout the year. There is a new location – Breton Community Centre – 4715 50th Avenue. Hope to see you there. **It will resume on January 4th, 2023**

Counselling Subsidies – Breton and Area FCSS is pleased to offer Counselling Subsidies. – A subsidy is available for individuals, couples and/or families who are struggling with common, everyday issues to access short-term preventative counselling services. The goal is to:

- Improve relationships with better communication and conflict resolution skills;
- Improve mood with anger management and emotional support;
- Enhance personal growth with creativity, spirituality, self-esteem, self-awareness, goal setting;
- Improve parenting skills by focusing on attachment;
- Reduce stress with life balance; and/or
- Learn new skills and behaviors

The cost of counselling can be a barrier for many individuals and families. This subsidy is available to those who do not have access to coverage through health benefits or employee benefits, such as an Employee Assistance Plan (EAP), and whose family income is less than \$75,000 per year. Fees are determined according to a sliding scale based on income and family size. Fees range from \$15 per session to \$45 per session. The maximum number of sessions available is seven for individuals and nine for couples or families.

We know that in this current environment many may have additional stress and anxiety. We also know that transportation may be an added barrier. These sessions can be arranged to be in person in the Karunia offices in Leduc, over the phone in your own safe environment or virtually on your computer.

To apply for the subsidy services, application forms are available through the Breton FCSS Office at 4916 50th Avenue or by contacting them at fcss@breton.ca or calling 780-696-3636. ALL APPLICATIONS ARE STRICTLY CONFIDENTIAL.

Breton and Area FCSS will be doing the intake of the applications. Counselling services are provided by Karunia Counselling by Registered Psychologists, Registered Provisional Psychologists, Canadian Certified Counsellors and Masters or PhD level student interns under the supervision of a qualified psychologist.

Breton and Area FCSS would like to thank each and everyone of you who have volunteered or given your time to help someone in our community this year. We have very generous people that live in our community who are always willing to lend a helping hand and it is very much appreciated. Merry Christmas to all and wishing everyone a year of good health and happiness in 2023.

CONSUMER FIREWORKS SAFETY

Consumer Fireworks are not toys. They are in fact, powerful pyrotechnic articles and, for this reason, both their sale and purchase are regulated.

YOU MUST OBTAIN A FIREWORKS PERMIT PRIOR TO DISCHARGING ANY FIREWORKS

Fireworks permit can be obtained from Drayton Valley Brazeau County Fire Services at 5120- 52nd in Drayton Valley during regular business hours, for a \$10 fee.

Fireworks permit application shall include the following information:

- Name, address, and signature of applicant
- The date and time of proposed display
- A detailed description of the proposed display
- The exact location planned for the fireworks display including a diagram of the grounds on which it will be held, showing the point from where the fireworks will be discharged, the location of all highways, and the lines behind which the audience will be restrained
- Written consent from the owner of the property on which the fireworks display will occur • The manner and place of storage of all fireworks prior to, during and after the display
- The name and address of the vendor or vendors that supplied or will supply all the fireworks used in the fireworks display

It is the responsibility of the permit holder to know the rules and regulations of the municipality in which they will be discharging the fireworks.

Fireworks Safety Tips

- Choose a wide, clear site away from all obstacles.
- Refer to the safety instructions on the fireworks label for minimum distance from spectators.
- Do not discharge fireworks in windy conditions.
- Read all instructions on the fireworks.
- Kids should never play with fireworks.
- Buy only legal fireworks (legal fireworks have a label with the manufacturer's name and directions; illegal ones are unlabeled), and store them in a cool, dry place. Illegal fireworks usually go by the names M-80, M100, blockbuster, or quarter pounder. These explosives were banned in 1966, but still account for many fireworks injuries.
- Never try to make your own fireworks
- Always use fireworks outside and have a bucket of water (or an ABC fire extinguisher) and a house nearby in case of an accident.
- Steer clear of others setting off fireworks. They can backfire or shoot off in the wrong direction.
- Use a good firing base such as a pail filled with earth or sand.
- Never throw or point fireworks at someone, even as a joke.
- Don't hold fireworks in your hand or have any part of your body over them while lighting. Recommended wearing eye protection.
- Light one firework at a time (never place fireworks in glass or metal containers), and **never** relight a dud.
- Don't allow kids to pick up pieces of fireworks after an event. Some may still be ignited and can explode at any time. Allow 30 minutes before cleaning-up debris, or before approaching a firework that did not go off.
- Soak all fireworks in a bucket of water before throwing them in the trash can.

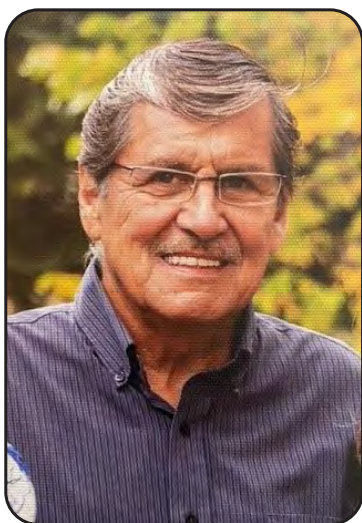

It's Here!!

"The Christmas Wish Book Is Here"

In bygone days, not so long ago, these words ringing in a home as the mail was delivered indicated the Christmas season was upon us. Before the days of on-line shopping, Amazon and retail malls the majority of people relied on mail order catalogues for much of their shopping needs. The two major catalogues of the time were from the T. Eaton Company and Simpson Sears. Over time the Simpson Sears Christmas Catalogue became known simply as the Sears Wish Book, a very appropriate name. From the many items available, you wrote out your order on the provided order form, and along with a Post Office money voucher you mailed it off. In about ten days your order wrapped in brown paper packaging would arrive, freight paid at the local post office. **Hey wait minute, doesn't that sound an awful lot like the precursor to Amazon and on-line shopping, less a credit card payment!**

From the yearly array of catalogues that would arrive periodically throughout the year, the most anticipated catalogue was the yearly Christmas Catalogue. Arriving some time during the fall, it contained in its pages a wide range of items, from the practical to we can only dream, for the whole family. There were the latest fashions for mother, toys, games and books for a child to dream of receiving, and for the men maybe a new fedora hat. The pages of the catalogue were longingly and lovingly thumbed through and dog-eared by Christmas time, as each member of the family dreamed of Christmas morning to see what was under the tree.

In the Breton Museum's collection, we have one of those dreams that came true for a little girl in Breton. In 1958, this little five-year girl discovered brides, possibly because their home was across the street from the Breton United Church. Christmas was coming and she wanted a bride doll. The little girl was Helen Raczuk, who grew up in Breton during the 1950's-1960's.

Helen wrote, typically gifts did include a toy, but the majority of gifts were more practical in nature: books, slippers, mittens, scarf, and the stocking filled with ribbon candy and the precious mandarin orange. Helen writes on Christmas morning, "Imagine my joy when I found a big box with my name on it and opened it to discover the most beautiful bride doll I had ever

seen! ... In my five-year-old mind, this was the best present ever. The doll didn't do anything but open and close her eyes. I couldn't play with her like other dolls and change clothes or feed her or comb her hair. But she was pretty to look at, and likely inspired the dreams of many little girls to be a bride".

Helen cherished her bride doll for over fifty years, but when she was downsizing and moving from her Spruce Grove home, the doll was donated to the Breton Museum along with the beautiful story that goes with it. Today the bride doll is one of the many cherished artifacts contained in the Breton Museum.

As the Holiday season is upon us, take time to relive some childhood memories of Christmas's past. Was there that treasured gift and do you still have it many years later? Share these memories with family and friends. From the Board and staff at the Breton Museum, we wish everyone the very best for the Holiday Season and the New Year.

**Dateline December 20th, 1913
Keystone, Alberta
Funnell School Holds Christmas
Concert**

This summer a lady stopped at the museum to express how much she enjoyed the stories in the Breton Booster. As we talked, I asked her if there was a topic she would like to see featured in an article. What about Christmas Concerts, she answered, they were held in every school and were synonymous with the Christmas Season. It was about a month later that I came across a detailed news article in the Leduc Representative, dated December 26, 1913. A Christmas concert had been held at the Funnell School; I would hazard a guess that this was the first Christmas concert ever held in the community. The article indicates that the school house was nicely decorated with evergreen boughs and paper streamers, along with a well-lit tree. Now you might ask, how was the tree lit with no electricity. You fire conscious type people hang on to your fire extinguisher and don't have a melt down, but the tree would have had small candle holders attached to the boughs of the tree with lit candles!

The program included an array of songs and recitations by the students and community members. Family names included: the Allen's, King's, Ramsey's, Hayes' and Baileys', all names associated with founding families of Keystone. After the completion of the Christmas program, gifts were handed out to the children. Not only had the whole Keystone community attended the concert, but guests from the surrounding communities.

Mr. Allen and Mr. Ramsey conveyed thanks to the teacher Mr. V.E. Nordlund for his work, and how well the students had done in the school term. In reply Mr. Nordlund expressed his sadness that this would be his farewell to the school, as he was returning to take additional teacher training. This Christmas concert was the start of many concerts that would take place, at Funnell, over the following decades.

During the 1930's money was scarce, and it was the unfailing support of the Funnell Mother's Club that would raise funds to help the teacher put on a Christmas concert. It was the Mother's Club that

continued the tradition after Funnell was closed as a school in 1954. Their support continued for fifty years at which time the community club took up the reins for many more years.

I recently spoke to Vi Westling, long time resident of the community, for her memories of the concerts. She spoke of her husband Theo acting as MC for many years and coming home chuckling about all the little ones performing. No Christmas Concert would be complete, without a visit from Santa handing out gifts and candy bags to the children. She recalled one little boy marched up to Santa and asked him ...where are your reindeer... the quick-thinking Santa answered, well while I am busy here passing out treats, I gave them a break so they could go get something to eat... Santa always had the right answer. Rest in Peace R.E.

Did you know that the Beatles performed at the Funnell Christmas concert in the 1960's, well not "THE BEATLES", but the Funnell version of the Beatles. With help from Vi, complete with plywood guitars and a black wig for the one girl who was blond haired, four young girls from the community air guitared their way to fame, if not fortune, for one night only.

The community history books abound with memories of Christmas Concerts. Betty Impey/ Williams speaks of her and her sisters with rag rollers in their hair to make it curl, and getting a new outfit for the concert even though money was in short supply. Others speak of bundling up in heavy quilts and heated rocks or irons to keep warm on the long sleigh ride to the local school house. Many mentioned the sleigh bells, with each set of bells having its own unique sound. While the sound of the sleigh bells has ceased, the memories of Christmas Concerts past have not.

4 Mindful Tips to De-Stress This Holiday Season

Managing Mood and Stress Managing Stress

Not feeling particularly cheery this time of year? You're not alone. Many find that the holidays bring as much stress as they do joy. But there are ways to ease through the season. To help make the most of your festivities, Neda Gould, Ph.D., clinical psychologist and director of the Johns Hopkins Mindfulness Program at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, shares some mindful tips.

What is mindfulness? *"Mindfulness is bringing your attention to the present moment with an element of nonjudgment and acceptance. It is noticing when we get caught up in thoughts about the past or the future, and returning our attention to the present — the only reality,"* explains Gould.

While mindfulness can be a formal meditation practice, there are also informal ways to practice this skill. This can give us perspective and decrease stress.

1. Accept Imperfection

Can good be good enough? *"As we gear up for the holidays, we often set the bar impossibly high for ourselves and then feel upset when our celebrations don't live up to expectations,"* says Gould.

Before you start preparing, acknowledge that things may not go exactly as planned. *"It's OK if it's not perfect. Imperfection is healthy and normal. For some of us, it might just take a little practice,"* reminds Gould.

2. Don't Lose Sight of What Really Counts

With long lines and nasty traffic, the holidays can get hectic. When overwhelmed by the hustle and bustle, ask yourself:

Where does this fit in the grand scheme of things? If you're frustrated by the long grocery line you're standing in, remember that it is just a long grocery line — nothing more. Don't let it spoil your afternoon.

Can I use this moment of frustration as an opportunity to reflect? While the cashier rings up the customers ahead of you, take inventory of the good things that have happened today or the things you are grateful for.

Even if this moment seems stressful, can I find a way to make it pleasant? Connect with someone else in

line with a compliment or kind gesture, or notice what's around you with fresh eyes and an open mind.

3. Respond with Kindness

You can't change how others act during the stresses of the holiday season, but you can change how you respond to situations:

"Whenever I encounter a difficult person, I tell myself, 'this person is suffering, and that's why they're acting this way.' It softens my frustration, helps me be more compassionate and reminds me that it's not personal," says Gould.

Keep in mind that the holidays are especially difficult for those who are alone. See if you can extend an act of kindness to those you know are without family and friends during this time of year.

If things do get tense with someone, take a few deep breaths. *"Those few breaths can shift things and give you new perspective,"* says Gould.

4. Rethink Your Resolutions

"Typical New Year's resolutions set you up for failure," warns Gould. If you want to better yourself in the New Year, follow these tips for success:

Start small. Break your goal into tinier steps over the course of the year. If weight loss is your goal, it doesn't have to be drastic. Try to eat more veggies during your first month and gradually cut back on sweets throughout the next, suggests Gould.

Be kind to yourself. If you didn't achieve last year's resolution or stray from the path this time around, let it go. *"We often contrive these stories ('I'm never going to quit smoking!') that only add to our distress,"* says Gould. *"With practice, we can notice this self-critic, let go of that negativity and pick our goals back up without the guilt or shame."*

RCMP WARN COMMUNITY OF SCAMS TARGETING BUSINESSES

RCMP are warning the public of Business Email Compromise frauds (BEC) and sharing safety tips to help protect businesses from falling victim to these scams.

BEC is a type of scam targeting companies who primarily send funds electronically. This is typically done by criminals gaining access to company email accounts (via phishing) or creating nearly identical email addresses (spoofing). Fraudsters then trick employees into forwarding business payments to a new bank account controlled by them.

Signs you may be communicating with a fraudster:

- Emails that usually have an email signature no longer do
- Any emails that are requesting payment in an urgent and out of character fashion
- Any requests via email that request a change in banking information
- Any changes in a predetermined agreement including method of payment, payment or invoice date, amount owing, person you are primarily in contact with, etc.

Ways to protect yourself and your business:

- Do not rely on email alone – always take the extra step to confirm any changes over the phone
- Minimize the risk of phishing/spoofing by adding known email addresses to your contact list and setting a flag or filter for any communication coming from outside your contacts
- Ensure email passwords are changed often and are strong (numbers, upper and lowercase letters and symbols as well as 10+ characters in length)
- Be wary of emails requesting personal information. Attackers may attempt to gather information by sending emails requesting that you confirm purchase or account information. Legitimate businesses will not solicit this type of information through email. Do not provide sensitive information through email
- Protect your devices by keeping the software up-to-date. Enable automatic software updates where applicable, as running the latest version of software helps ensure the manufacturers are still supporting it and providing the latest patches for

vulnerabilities.

- Do not click links or download attachments unless you're confident of where they came from. If you're unsure if an email is legitimate, type the URL of the retailer or other company into your web browser as opposed to clicking the link
- Some attackers may try to trick you by creating malicious websites that appear to be legitimate. Always verify the legitimacy before supplying any information. If you've never heard of it before, check twice before handing over your information

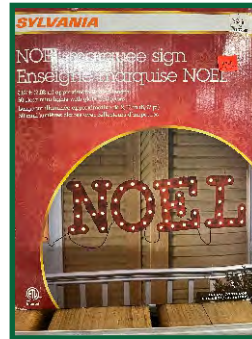

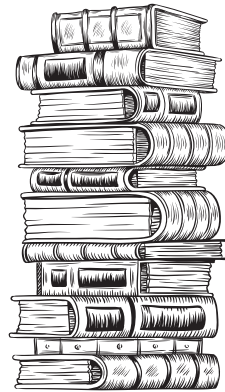

13 - Just because..... Do we really need a reason to be kind? *Just. Be. Kind.*

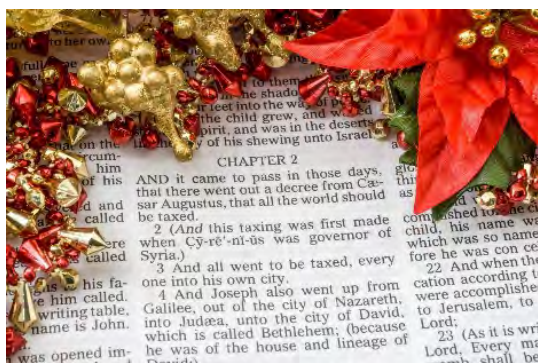

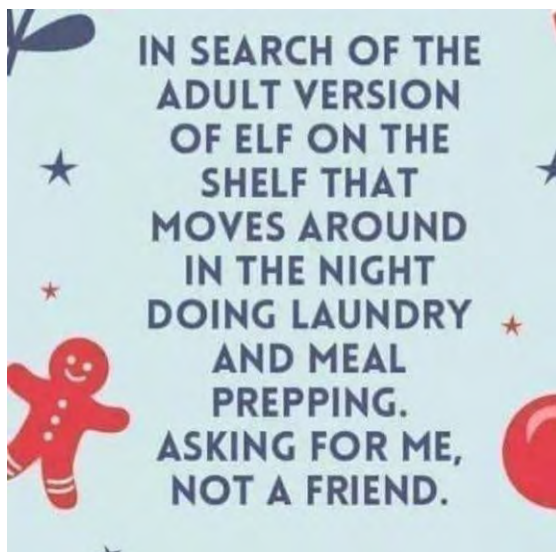
