BRETON NEW K-12 NEEDS NAME

With the expected modernization of Breton High School into a K-12 school, the Board of Trustees will need to decide on a new school name for the modernized K-12 school.

Although the WRSD Board of Trustees will make the final decision regarding the name of the school, they would like to give the Breton community an opportunity to provide suggested names. According to Wild Rose School Division "Policy 02 - Appendix C - Naming of Facilities- Procedures"

2.1 *individual's names should not be used for school names, with the exception where a case can be made for a person of historical significance*

2.2 *if there is only one school, or one school with that specific grade configuration in each community or region, consideration should be given for those schools to bear the name of the community or region.*

2.3 *the name shall not imply the Division's endorsement of partisan political or ideological positions, nor of commercial products or services.*

2.4 *unless otherwise directed by the Board, naming options shall include suggestions solicited from the community.*

Please see Wild Rose School Division "Policy 02 - Appendix C - Naming of Facilities" for the entire policy .

The Board will only consider names that align with these policy guidelines.

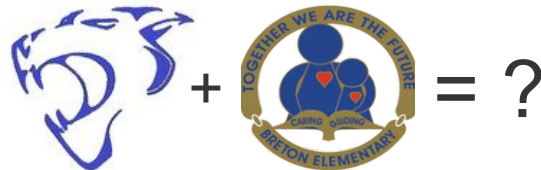

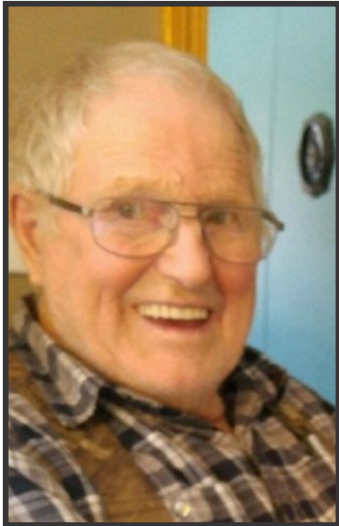

Counselling Subsidies

Breton and Area FCSS is pleased to offer Counselling Subsidies. A subsidy is available for individuals, couples and/or families who are struggling with common, everyday issues to access short-term preventative counselling services.

The cost of counselling can be a barrier for many individuals and families. This subsidy is available to those who do not have access to coverage through health benefits or employee benefits, such as an Employee Assistance Plan (EAP), and whose family income is less than \$75,000 per year. Fees are determined according to a sliding scale based on income and family size. Fees range from \$15 per session to \$50 per session. The maximum number of sessions available is seven for individuals and nine for couples or families.

We know that in this current environment many may have additional stress and anxiety. We also know that transportation may be an added barrier. These sessions can be arranged to be in person in the Karunia offices in Leduc, over the phone in your own safe environment or virtually on your computer.

Village of Breton LETTER TO THE EDITOR RESPONSE

Dear Mr. Oberle,

Thank you for your letter of concern regarding the Breton Municipal Library and the Breton and Area Community Centre.

The transparency of board appointments is followed as per the requirements when performed. It is required that appointments be done in open session, at a public meeting, by the founding municipality. This is how the Village Council performs this task and the appointments are recorded in the respective meeting minutes. If appointments require a special council meeting to be called, then this is done in accordance with Municipal Affairs guidelines.

Individuals were removed from the library board, even though they still had time on their terms, due to the conduct of the board members. When individuals accept a position as a library board member, they accept the responsibility to act in the best interest of the library board. That was not being done. The Village Council and administration had been approached by other board members expressing their concern on the behavior of some board members as well as the processes that weren't being followed while in meetings. After the Council heard the concerns voiced by other board members and consulted with the Public Library Services Branch (PLSB) of Municipal Affairs, they made the decision to act in accordance with the PLSB advice and in the best interest of the success of the library. With the productiveness of the current board in their short tenure, it appears that Council made the appropriate decision. The former board had items that needed to be addressed and hadn't been able to achieve this in 12 months while the current board achieved it in 3 weeks. A review of the 2022/2023 Library board minutes will show the absence of an effective board with very few items executed in that time frame.

We understand and can appreciate your perspective that it appears the County of Brazeau doesn't have any oversight of the library expenditures. The process of the approval of funds within the library structure is not approved at each meeting of the library board. The library board forms a budget committee who then works in conjunction with input from the library manager to formulate an annual budget. At this point the library

board presents their budget to the Village Council when requesting the annual appropriation. Once the Village Council approves the annual appropriation the Library Board then can approve their budget since they now know the total of funded income being received for the fiscal year. The County of Brazeau has entered into a two-year funding agreement with the library, not the Village. And a condition of that funding agreement is to have the library budget forwarded to the County once approved each year. So even before the budgeting process begins, your tax dollars, as referred to in your letter, are already allocated to the library from the County of Brazeau. Then once the budget has been approved by the library board the library manager is given the budget with which the library operates for the year. So, any oversight of spending that is gained from a seat on the board is via financial records provided at each meeting, of which can also be provided to County Council and provide the same oversight.

The largest factor in not having a council member from either municipality on the board is to maintain unblurred lines of roles and responsibilities. When a council member sits on the library board, they are a library board member, not council member nor council representative. In the recent past council members appointed to the board have forgotten this very important definition. So, to appoint a council member to the board as a board member but expecting them to be acting in the best interests of their respective municipality contradicts the role and obligation of a library board member. I have enclosed a copy of the Municipal Councils and Library Boards - Roles and Responsibilities publication for your reference. An alternative, as we previously suggested, is for any municipal council wishing to have a representative attend the library meeting assign a member of their council to attend as an observer. Any items that the council may wish for the library board to discuss could then be asked to be added to the upcoming library board meeting once the council representative has discussed it with their council.

To speak to your point regarding funding the Village of Breton has received in the recent past from Brazeau County, you are correct that Brazeau has been very supportive to the Village of Breton in many ways including monetary contributions to capital projects. Support that the Village is very, very grateful for. We are also very appreciative that Brazeau County Council and administration has instilled the confidence in our Breton Council and administration to effectively manage our finances including those contributions from other organizations. Similar to what we, the municipality, are trying to do for the library. When you speak of a moral or ethical obligation, we feel that this is rather histrionic. It is common practice that municipalities contribute to neighbouring municipal projects and/or programs, without involving themselves in the day to day construction and/ or management. To have you suggest that any of the construction deficiencies of the Breton

and Area Community Centre could have been averted by having Brazeau County “oversight”, as you referenced it, is insulting and in our opinion is an unsubstantiated correlation to the library operations. There are currently no deficiencies outstanding from the construction of the facility. We also feel it prudent to mention that the list of deficiencies you refer to is 3 years old at minimum. There are repair items that have resulted from use of the building, as is to be expected of any facility, of which are all being handled accordingly.

In closing it is the position that Breton Village Council will not be appointing council members to the Breton Municipal Library board this year. It will be reviewed with the library board for next year. Until that time, Brazeau County Council is welcome to assign a council member to attend any public meetings of the library board as previously stated.

Thank you for your continued interest in the Breton and area communities.

BRAZEAU COUNTY COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

January 16, 2024 Regular Council Meeting

Emergency Management Preparation

Chief Administrative Officer Kent Edney gave a verbal update on ongoing emergency management preparations, including:

- the recent request for proposal for professional
- help to assist with the County's Emergency Response Plan;
- planned intense training for staff with a target completion date of April 1, 2024;
- the compilation of a non-governmental local contractor list;
- the Fire Chief working with a local dozer boss and hosting dozer boss training sessions for private equipment operators;
- offering a course on proper water hauling procedures, with the intent to familiarize local
- contractors so they can assist in an emergency in compliance with Incident Command System (ICS) safe operating practices;
- Fire Smart programs and the production of instructional videos for landowners on how to protect their properties.

Speed Limit Amendment Bylaw for Township Road 492

Council gave first reading to Bylaw 1171-24, which will reduce the speed limit to 60km/hr along Township Road 492 extending 750 meters west of Range Road 80. The change assists in providing safer turning opportunities onto and off Township Road 492. A public hearing on the bylaw will be held at 10 a.m. on February 20, 2024 during the regular Council meeting.

Topics for Ministerial Discussion

Council will inform Minister of Municipal Affairs Ric McIver that the issues it wishes to discuss with him at an upcoming meeting are:

- the well drilling tax;
- Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework (ICF) legislative changes;
- party affiliations for municipal elected officials

Councillors normally meet with the minister during the Rural Municipalities of Alberta spring convention to discuss issues important to the municipality, in addition to regular communication throughout the year.

Blasting any happy-making tune can work multiple mind-body wonders including reducing pain during exercise, elevating mood, and lowering stress, research shows. So make a playlist — any songs that boost your spirit will do the job.

45- Start walking more.

Even if you can't keep track of a new fitness routine, keeping yourself moving on a simple walk around the neighborhood is a must. Adults should spend as much time moving each day as possible — and some physical activity (even just walking!) is better than none.

46- Write to yourself.

When your inner critic picks up her bullhorn, jot down the kind words you'd say to a friend in the same situation. "We have such a hard time channeling compassion for ourselves," says Emma Seppala, Ph.D., of Stanford's Center for Compassion and Altruism Research. "Writing it down makes it easier to shift perspective."

From the farm to the office, civil engineers Leo, Corry and Martin Broks build successful Alberta-based engineering firms from the ground up

Growing up on a mixed farm in Winfield, a small hamlet in central Alberta, the Broks brothers – Leo, Corry and Martin – were no strangers to hard work. As farm boys and the sons of immigrants from the Netherlands, they were expected to milk the cows, among other chores, and attend school.

Education was a priority for the Broks family. “Our parents had a rule – we had to finish high school and that rule was non-negotiable,” says Corry, (P. Eng), adding that all three brothers would eventually earn civil engineering degrees from the University of Alberta.

In 1976, Leo started AI-Terra Engineering Ltd., a successful Edmonton-based engineering and landscape design firm, still in operation. Corry would also join the firm, and in 1989, Martin joined as manager of the Red Deer office of D.A. Watt Consulting Group, which AI-Terra had purchased the previous year.

The family business thrived under the careful stewardship of Leo Brok, (P. Eng), who served as President and CEO for 32 years, followed by Corry, who served in the same role for another decade. The current President and CEO, Sheldon Hudson, (P.Eng, MBA), started at AI-Terra as a U of A co-op student, and several employees are also former co-op students.

One of the reasons Corry was drawn to civil engineering, he says, is the intuitive, common sense nature of the field and the versatility of the degree. Initially he worked in municipal engineering and land development but switched to transportation planning when the recession of the 1980s shrunk the economy. Through adversity and success, Corry could always rely on his brothers.

“Working with Leo and Martin has been great,” he says. “Great partners and exceptional engineers. They work very hard in the best interest of their clients, and both are ethical and honest and always take the high road in their professional and personal lives. I learned from Leo that taking the high road professionally is always the prudent approach to dealing

with issues and people.”

For the last 25 years Corry has been a project manager for AI-Terra’s large, complex transportation projects, including the Walterdale Bridge and the Calgary Trail/23 Avenue Interchange, where AI-Terra partnered with other local firms to complete the services required.

“I feel AI-Terra has built a solid reputation in our industry and has given back abundantly in the communities in which we work,” says Corry. “Civil engineering has been an enjoyable and gratifying career choice and in my twilight years, it’s cool to show my grandchildren successful projects that I have worked on. My grandchildren call Waterdale Bridge “Opa’s Bridge”, because they know I was involved in that project. I have not had the heart to tell them I only planned and designed the roadways!”

Like Corry, Martin Broks (P. Eng) followed his brother Leo into civil engineering for the career opportunities but also because it seemed like a good fit, temperamentally.

“As farmers, we were very hands-on and we were always building or fixing things – just like engineers do,” says Martin. “As well, our oldest brother John was a civil technologist and was already working for Alberta Transportation while I was still in grade school, so why not choose engineering?”

In 2000, AI-Terra separated into two separate companies – AI-Terra Engineering Ltd., the Edmonton based company owned by Leo and Corry, and AI-Terra Engineering (Red Deer) Ltd., the Red Deer based company owned by Martin. As each company continued to grow in size, with AI-Terra (Edmonton) adding another office in Calgary, the decision was made to change the name of the Red Deer operation to Aptus Engineering Ltd., in 2023, where Martin continues to serve as President and CEO.

Though two separate companies, the brothers still work together on projects from time to time. "Working with my brothers has always been an enjoyable experience," says Martin. "I relied on Leo, in particular, for his mentorship relating to the business management aspect of the company, both when we were one company, and even after we became separate companies. It's always more satisfying when you are working with family."

Both Al-Terra and Aptus Engineering are employee-owned companies, a business model that gives employees a greater stake in the company's success. Reciprocity is at the core of the brothers' business philosophy, which also includes many community outreach initiatives.

"Certainly, I am proud of some of the projects I worked on – the subdivisions that turned out very well, the road projects that we're all now driving on," says Martin. "However, the thing I am most proud of is that we shared the opportunity of ownership in the companies with our key employees. It gives me great pleasure to know the people that are continuing to make the company a success are also receiving significant benefits from ownership in the company."

To the Broks brothers, giving back has always been a top priority. In addition to their support of co-op students throughout the years, many of whom have become full-time employees, Al-Terra Engineering also supports the Broks Family Bursary in Civil and Environmental Engineering.

All three brothers continue to work in various capacities for their respective companies, and remain strong supporters of civil engineering as a career.

"Most people want variety in their work life and civil engineering gives you that opportunity," says Martin, adding that the U of A engineering program remains highly regarded across Canada. "I have spent my whole career in municipal engineering, and while there is no good reason for me to be still working – my "job" is now my "hobby!"

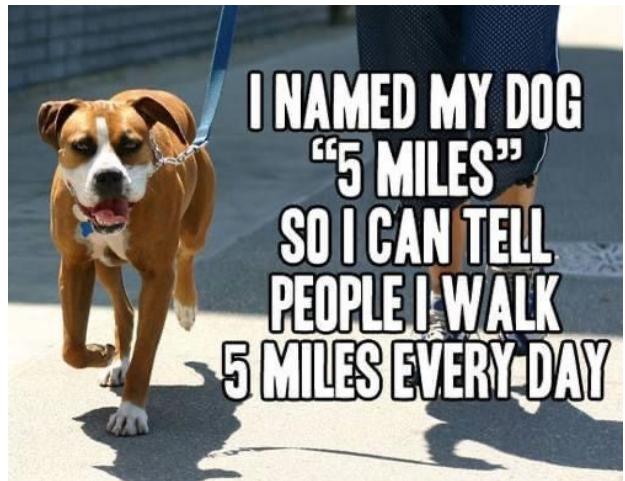

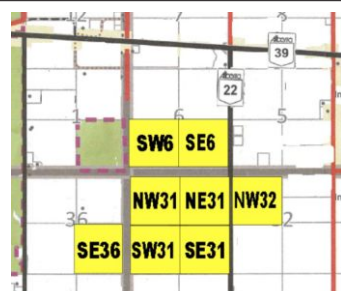

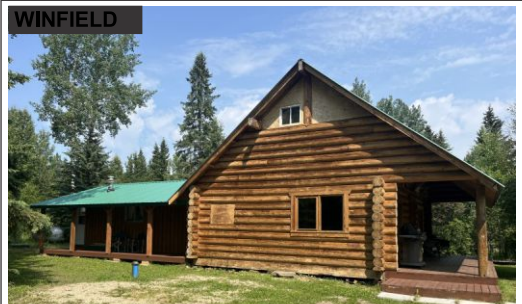
